Volunteer department responses reported

Volunteer fire Chief Richard Paris reported to the Grand Coulee City Council last Tuesday that his department made eight fire calls and responded to 34 ambulance calls during the month of July.

The fire calls included two in Grand Coulee as standby for fireworks, mutual aid for other departments, one in Grant County Fire District 14 responding to smoke, and two to Lincoln County Fire District 9 on fireworks and smoke investigation. In ambulance runs, seven were in the Coulee Dam area, 22 in Grand Coulee, and five were transporting patients to medical facilities out of town. In total, Paris reported, his department has responded to 262 calls so far this year.

Corps to fly in

Airport Manager Bob Babler advised that the Army Corps of Engineers will be landing its Metroliner airplane here on Wednesday, Aug. 24, at about 4:30 p.m. The plane is based in Omaha and landed here two years ago. Babler said the plane will be here overnight and fly out Thursday morning around 11:30 a.m. The Metroliner is a 19-passenger airliner with a 57-foot wingspan, much larger than the small aircraft the Grand Coulee Dam Airport typically sees.

Bank collecting school supplies for kids

North Cascades Bank is still accepting donations for its annual back-to-school drive for school supplies. The bank collects cash and items on specified on a list at the bank to help local students. Donations can be dropped off at the Grand Coulee branch, 608 Midway Ave., through the end of the month.

Fires banned on Lake Roosevelt

The National Park Service Friday issued a ban on all fires, including camp fires and any other open flames in the Lake Roosevelt National Recreation Area.

Exceptions include self-contained propane or gas stoves, but propane campfires are not allowed.

The ban was implemented due to "extreme conditions" that also prompted the state Dept. of Natural Resources to ban all fires in DNR-managed or protected lands.

EDC working with city on business district

An idea to better define Grand Coulee's business district was well received by the city's planning commission, and could turn out to be a partnership effort with the city and the Chamber of Commerce's Economic Development Council (EDC).

City Councilmember Tamara Byers, who also sits on the planning commission, told fellow council members that the EDC had offered up some good ideas and that the commission would continue working with them.

The EDC has proposed signage and lighting changes on what has been described as the city's business district, mainly Midway Avenue, Main Street, Federal Avenue and Spokane Way.

EDC spokesman Bob Valen said that if his group and the city jointly apply for grant funding he thought there would be better chance of success.

Lighting, Valen said, could be special aluminum poles with acorn-style fixtures for a 1940s look. It would take nine poles and lights for Midway Avenue alone, with the costs about \$2,500 per

Truck, trailer, tools reported stolen

He said the trailer had been parked across the street from the Gerard Building office in Electric City, to which the doors were locked. Tipps said he thought the trailer hitch had a lock on it also.

Police did not have suspects at the time.

Family vacation ends in inferno

At the end of a week of vacation on the lake, Wade Taylor and his family were getting ready to head back home to Grand Coulee when they saw smoke in the sky from an origin too nearby.

"That's pretty darn close," Taylor thought as he was helping his cousin launch a boat on the Spokane River arm of Lake Roosevelt.

The fire would eventually take about 80 percent of their 80 acres of half-timbered property perched above the lake near Cayuse Cove, consuming a barn, trees and more, and burning right to the edge of a short patch of green grass in front of a row of small trailers.

His family property is perched on a ridge about a half mile above the lake and a few miles from where the Hart Fire started last weekend, then blew up on Sunday in conditions the National Weather Service had been warning would quickly spread fire starts.

Cousins, uncles and their families prepared to get out. They set sprinklers near the trailers and moved two of their four-wheel ve-

Reclamation awards \$19 million contract for pump-generating plant upgrades at dam

The Bureau of Reclamation awarded a \$19 million contract to replace and upgrade two pump-generating units at Grand Coulee Dam, the bureau announced Monday in a press release.

The contract awarded Aug. 11 to American Hydro, of York, Pennsylvania, calls for replacing and updating equipment for pump generating units 5 and 6 at the John W. Keys III Pump Generating Plant.

"This effort is pivotal to the infrastructure

modernization at the Keys Plant," said Reclamation Commissioner Estevan López. "The pump units will provide greater efficiency, flexibility and capacity in hydropower production and water delivery."

Construction will take place over the next two years while accommodating for irrigation demand. It is scheduled to be finished by January 2020.

The work continues a 20-year modernization effort at the plant, the Bureau said. The

project is funded through Bonneville Power Administration, South Columbia Basin Irrigation District, Quincy Columbia Basin Irrigation District, East Columbia Basin Irrigation District and Congressional appropriations.

American Hydro is a leading supplier and installer of large equipment for the hydroelectric and water distribution industries, specializing in design, manufacture, upgrades and servicing of high-performance hydro-turbines and pumps, the Bureau said.

Mayors reflect on consolidation survey

The public interest in consolidating local cities impressed at least one city official last week. Grand Coulee Mayor Paul Townsend said that the number of people interested in the consolidation of Grand Coulee and Electric City was "impressive."

A report last week to the city council on the results of a consolidation survey by the Grand Coulee Dam Area Chamber of Commerce's Economic Development Council was the second of four presentations planned before municipalities in the area.

A week earlier, the EDC had


made a similar report on its survey to the Electric City Council and now is primed to do the same at Coulee Dam.

EDC member Marlene Oddie explained that the survey had been sent out to 2,235 households, with 546 returned — a 24.4-percent response, well over the average for surveys.

The responses showed that 76 percent stated they were either strongly (59.9 percent) interested in consolidation or somewhat (16.3 percent) interested in consolidation.

"Those are impressive numbers," Townsend said again this

Cleanup of city a frustrating process

Grand Coulee is having trouble making its public nuisance ordinance work.

City council members last week heard two local residents

complain about problems in their neighborhoods, saying that the city isn't doing anything about it.

A Partello Street resident complained that a neighbor had wood piled next to his property line and also a bark pile that is

infested with bugs.

In that case, city Code Enforcer Jolena Mills said that according to the city's nuisance ordinance the homeowner in question is not in violation of the code. A drive-by inspection showed that the wood-

pile was covered with a blue tarp; other than that, the property appeared cared for.

Mills said maybe the complaining resident "doesn't like to look at a woodpile just outside his front door," but "it isn't a violation of code."

The council also heard a complaint from Becky Billups, who lives on Burdin Boulevard.

She has appeared before the council at least a dozen times to complain about a neighborhood problem of old cars, tires and junk in general that she faces every day.

Mills said that she has repeatedly advised the tenant of the property in question that he is in violation of the city's code.

"I have also contacted the owner of the property, several times. No response," Mills said. "Occasionally they will move a car

hicles down the hill to the beach, close to the water.

"By that time it was like, we better get the hell out of here," Taylor said.

Some left by road, but just got out before that exit was cut off by the advancing fire, Taylor said Tuesday. He and his family got on their pontoon boat to take shelter on the water and saw it jump the river onto the Spokane Indian Reservation, burning houses and cabins along the river.

"It was pretty wild," he said.

As they headed up the river, ahead of the fire, Taylor said his cousin, Mike Thompson, picked up five people stranded on the beach.

"It just moved so fast, and once it got on the rez side, it was gone," Taylor said.

When the fire reached their barn, which held another all-terrain vehicle and fuel, "it was huge," Taylor said. Trees ignited in "fire bursts" as they watched, and "you had glows on both sides of the river."

The family spent the night on the boat in Mocassin Bay. By 6 a.m. the landscape was just smoldering. Their property was blackened.

Taylor said they had set out to make a memorable vacation for

their kids, ages 9 and 11.

"The kids got something to remember," he said.

But he spent Tuesday morning analyzing their insurance needs.

The Hart Fire had reportedly burned about 4,200 acres by Tuesday night, was 10 percent contained, and the entire area is un-

der a Level II evacuation notice, meaning people should be ready to leave immediately.

North of the river, the fire is under management now as the Cayuse Mountain Fire, which has reportedly burned 12,700 acres and 13 homes so far. It is 30 percent contained.

around, but the problem is never corrected."

"We are all frustrated at times," Mills said, "but we need to keep account of people's property rights. What is a nuisance to one person might not be to another."

"Still, the city wants residents to file complaints when they think the code is being violated, and we will check it out," Mayor Paul Townsend said. "The names of those making complaints are not used, so it is a private situation."

"Our code enforcer has had tremendous success by convincing people that they need to clean their places up, I think in maybe 75 percent of the time," Townsend added.

When Mills spots a problem area in the city, her first response is to knock on the door and review the violation with the party.

week.

"We have to do what the citizens want, because we are here to serve them," Townsend stated in an interview. "Maybe some kind of advisory ballot would help. If the citizens of Grand Coulee want to consolidate with Electric City, they need to let us know."

He alluded to one of the survey comments that stated, "If it isn't broken, don't fix it." Townsend stated, "I wouldn't want to buy a car from that person."

Grand Coulee is looking for a

lot of input from local citizens so that the council knows the directions that people want to go.

Electric City Mayor John Nordine II had a little different take on consolidation.

"If Grand Coulee wanted to annex to Electric City and throw everything out and start a new city, that would be a start," Nordine said Monday.

"I tried to set up a meeting with Grand Coulee, but my call wasn't returned," Nordine added.

Nordine was asked by his

council to meet with Townsend to see the level of interest in consolidating the two cities.

"It really isn't up to me; the council will have to make the decision," Nordine added. He said that the consolidation issue had come up a year ago and nothing had come of it.

The Star reported in February 2015 that the Electric City Council had agreed to fund half of a study of the idea, but the funds were not put in the budget for 2016.

quires a "respectful/professional tone" but does not define it, leaving censorship in whole (paragraph 4); Editor determines his or her own "facts" (paragraph 5); Editor determines what "hatred, contempt, suspicion or wrongdoing, scorn or ridicule" means and will censor according to the editor's "belief" (paragraph 6). These standards are outside the bounds of journalistic "libel laws," therefore, they narrow the scope of free speech and free thought, and, in actuality, eliminate both.

I was present during the March/April 2013 Management and Budget Committee meeting,

where Committee Chair Billy Nicholson held court, and Mike Finley, Clowncil chair, sat next to, and huddled with, Billy. It was then they said (I paraphrase), "People don't want to read these opinions," in reference to the letters to the editor. Then the new censorship began.

This letter about TT censorship was, itself, censored by the TT wizards, based upon the Clowncil's printed "Letters to the editor policy."





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Obituaries

Alma (Ayling) Schreiber

Alma Schreiber, 86, died peacefully at her Electric City, Washington, home on Wednesday, August 17, 2016. She was born June 14, 1930, in Great Falls, Montana, to James and Alma (Lehman) Ayling. The oldest of nine children, Alma was "JoJo" to her brothers and sisters. In 1934 her family moved to the Grand Coulee, Washington area, and this is where Alma called "home" for the remainder of her life. The family settled in the Osborne area, originally making their home in a tent with a dirt floor, which was not unusual at the time. The 1939 Osborne town directory lists their address in a spot where Banks Lake now covers. At that time the population of Osborne was 652, Electric City was 1,741 and Delano had a population of 673.



Alma was 11 years old on December 7, 1941. In the early 1940s, the family relocated to the Lone Pine area, just north of Coulee Dam, Washington. Alma attended Mason City High School (The Mason City Beavers) in what is now Coulee Dam. She graduated in 1948, the same year Mason City was incorporated into Coulee Dam, and thus was part of the first graduating class to receive a Coulee Dam High School diploma, which she still has in her drawer at home.



After high school, Alma worked as a waitress at the Green Hut cafe, where the visitor center now stands. It was there that she became reacquainted with a young man, Ron Schreiber, a lifelong Electric City resident who had just arrived home, discharged from his tour in the Navy on September 20, 1949. They were married in Coulee Dam on November 26, 1949.

Alma and Ron purchased their first home site in Electric City in 1955. Other than some temporary addresses necessary to follow various construction work, as Ron was an ironworker, they always lived at the same Electric City address. During their early married years Alma was employed as a secretary at both the Colville Agency and the USBR. However, her most enjoyable employment was as Head Cook in the Grand Coulee Schools from 1973 – 1990. She so enjoyed the kids each year and making sure

they had the best-tasting, most-nutritional meals (including bread made from scratch), always staying within her school budget. Budgeting and stretching a dollar to provide good meals is something that came naturally to a lady whose roots included temporarily living in a tent during the depression era.

Alma and Ron enjoyed traveling, and traveled extensively in their retirement years. Their trips included tours/visits to Europe, China, Russia, many trips to Canada and Mexico, and numerous cruises. For Alma's 65th birthday her kids bought her, and other family members, a week-long raft trip through the Grand Canyon. That and a Disney cruise with the grandkids and great-grandkids are the trips she most loves to reminisce about. For many winters Ron and Alma would "snowbird" to Arizona with their "5th Wheel," which included stays in both established parks and just "boondocking" in the desert. All that, and camping at Swan Lake with "the kids," created treasured family memories that span generations.

Alma was preceded in death by her first brother, Walt (Luann) Ayling, and her sister Mary (Steve) Boller. She is survived by her husband, Ron Schreiber; her daughter, Laura, of Buckeye, Arizona; son, Roger (Pam), of Electric City; and six remaining brothers and sisters: Eloise (Ken) Bowman, Electric City; Frank (Dorothy) Ayling, Wenatchee; Moya Barton, Roseburg, Oregon; Deets (Patti) Ayling, Grand Coulee; Derinda (Steve) Foster and Cholette Ayling, both of Emmet, Idaho; three grandchildren, seven great-grandchildren, one great-great-granddaughter, and many extended family members. Each of the above family members was able to travel to Grand Coulee and spend time with Alma this July. She so loved the times spent with "all the kids." She is beloved by her family and will always be fondly remembered.

At Alma and Ron's request there will not be a formal service held. Her family will gather to celebrate her life at a time yet to be determined.



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Former NFL player helps at Raider football practice

Former NFL tight end Nate Overbay spent some time with the Lake Roosevelt Raiders football team on Monday to talk to them about his knowledge of the sport as well as to participate in their practice.

Having played football at the high school, college, and pro level, Overbay was able to offer his insights about being an athlete, and life in general.

"It's a mindset," he said. "Everything in life is a challenge and you have to find ways to get over it. You've got to be a student of the game. ... If you're not going to be a student of the game, you're only going to succeed so much."

Overbay continued: "Help your teammates as much as you can, live your life to the fullest, and just enjoy it. If you don't enjoy it, why are you out here? This is a fun game. Football is fun. If you don't make it fun, then you're ultimately not out here for the right reasons. And that's life in general... if you're not having fun, what are you doing it for?"

Overbay is also part owner of the APX program. APX stands for Advanced Performance X-Train.

Head Coach Loren Endsley and his (now) wife, Cassie, brought the program to LR in the summer of 2015. The company is involved with athletes and high schools around Washington, Oregon, Idaho, and Montana and continues to expand. They emphasize a comprehensive approach to athletics that includes specific training for specific sports, as well as accentu-

ating nutrition to get the best performances out of athletes, as well as to prevent injuries.

Overbay says improper nutrition is related to 90 percent of sports injuries.

"You're going to tear something because you ate McDonalds before you played a game, or drank a soda before you played a game, or [you're] not eating breakfast before you lift," he said. "As soon as the kids buy into that, the results that they get are just stupid, in a good way."

APX has seen great success with Lake Roosevelt.

"Cassie [Endsley] has been a huge thing here with the girl influence," Overbay noted. "She's taken this from two girls to 40 to 50. Softball was unreal this year with the results they saw."

Overbay said the APX program at Lake Roosevelt started with two kids a year ago. "To see now they have 60 to 70 every morning, they have numbers now which they never had here."

Overbay, born and raised in Chehalis before attending Eastern Washington University, spent a few years in the NFL before retiring in 2013.

"He's been through it all," commented Raider Elijah Harris. "He knows his stuff, and he's talking to us."

"Being someone who dreams of going to play at the next level, it's really important that he tells us to enjoy this," Harris continued. "It's really inspiring to see someone who's been through every level of sports come and talk."



Childfind Screening Applications Available At School District Office

Birth to age five preschool children not currently enrolled in the Grand Coulee Dam School District may be eligible for a free developmental screening. Interested parents should request forms for a developmental screening and health inventory from the School District Office. It is especially important for a parent to complete the forms if they think their child may be developmentally delayed, i.e. be in need of occupational/physical or speech therapy, or other possible health problems that may impede a child from being ready for learning. Completed forms need to be returned to the District Office.

Completed forms submitted by parents/guardians will be reviewed and a determination will be made as to whether the child needs to be scheduled for additional Childfind Screening and/or assessments.

Parents/guardians will be notified of results of the developmental screening as soon as possible. Parents/guardians of children considered in need of additional services will be notified to schedule further assessments.

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) (20 U.S.C. § 1232g; 34 CFR Part 99) is a Federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. The law applies to all schools that receive funds under an applicable program of the U.S. Department of Education.

FERPA gives parents certain rights with respect to their children's education records. These rights transfer to the student when he or she reaches the age of 18 or attends a school beyond the high school level. Students to whom the rights have transferred are "eligible students."

*Parents or eligible students have the right to inspect and review the student's education records maintained by the school. Schools are not required to provide copies of records unless, for reasons such as great distance, it is impossible for parents or eligible students to review the records. Schools may charge a fee for copies.

*Parents or eligible students have the right to request that a school correct records, which they believe to be inaccurate or misleading. If the school decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student then has the right to a formal hearing. After the hearing, if the school still decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student has the right to place a statement with the record setting forth his or her view about the contested information.

*Generally, schools must have written permission from the parent or eligible student in order to release any information from a student's education record. However, FERPA allows schools to disclose those records, without consent, to the following parties or under the following conditions (34 CFR § 99.31):

- * School officials with legitimate educational interest;
- * Other schools to which a student is transferring;
- * Specified officials for audit or evaluation purposes;
- * Appropriate parties in connection with financial aid to a student;
- * Organizations conducting certain studies for or on behalf of the school;
- * Accrediting organizations;
- * To comply with a judicial order or lawfully issued subpoena;
- * Appropriate officials in cases of health and safety emergencies; and
- * State and local authorities, within a juvenile justice system, pursuant to specific State law.

Schools may disclose, without consent, "directory" information such as a student's name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, honors and awards, and dates of attendance. However, schools must tell parents and eligible students about directory information and allow parents and eligible students a reasonable amount of time to request that the school not disclose directory information about them. Schools must notify parents and eligible students annually of their rights under FERPA.

The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the District to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA is:






