Electric City plans hearing on car tab fee

A public hearing on Electric City's new transportation benefit district could be held Sept. 25, City Clerk Jackie Perman said this week.

The city planned the hearing to let the public speak to the fact that the city will charge residents \$20 for each licensed vehicle they own.

Perman said that the Sept. 25 date was the earliest that the public hearing could be set.

Through a new law, the city can now charge a \$20 license fee for each licensed vehicle a resident owns. The fee would be collected

when a person purchases their tabs.

Mayor Jerry Sands explained to his council that, the way the new law reads, if the city doesn't establish the transportation benefit district, the county could do so and collect the fee for county programs.

To emphasize his point, Sands told the council that the city had \$1.125 million in its street program in 2009, but in 2011, that amount was down to \$937,000. He pointed out that the fund was slowly being depleted since the city no longer was being funded by the state at the former license fee rate.

Athlete to pursue world record at Grand Columbian

A Utah father of five will go after his second world record here Sept. 15 when the Grand Columbian Triathlon offers him his 23rd iron-distance race (2.4 mile swim, 112 mile bike, 26.2 mile run) since January. He's in pursuit of 30 within a year.

James Lawrence already holds the record for half-iron distances races, according to Guinness World Records. He completed 22 of them in 30 weeks in 2010.

His schedule will take him to 10 countries on five continents this year, with races in Mexico, New Zealand, Australia, Brazil, South Africa, Switzerland, Germany and Austria. He will complete two races in his home country, Canada.

Lawrence, 35, calls the whole effort "Tri and Give a Dam." That

refers to how the idea of setting world records (and blogging about it at triandgiveadam.blogspot.com) originally occurred to him as he was looking for a way to integrate his love for triathlon with his efforts to bring water to people in Kenya.

Currently a personal trainer at Gold's Gym, Lawrence was hired in 2009 at a non-profit called Our Own Quiet Way, which is focused on putting in dams, boreholes and wells in strategic places in drought-stricken Kenya. He still volunteers, mostly through his triathlete pursuits to raise awareness of the effort.

Banks Lake drawdown in "preferred alternative" to bolster farm irrigation

After seven years of study, the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation and the state Dept. of Ecology have identified a solution to drying wells in potato country south of Grand Coulee Dam: draw down Banks Lake farther in August.

The agencies issued last Friday a statement that they have completed the "Odessa Subarea Special Study Final Environmental Impact Statement" (FEIS).

The study identifies several alternatives to address a declining aquifer and avoid collapsing a reported \$600 million annual farm industry that currently relies on drying-up wells, mostly within

the original bounds of the never-finished Columbia Basin Project.

Over the years, the agencies offered several alternatives, took public comments on them, then decided on two other alternatives, finally blessing one they call 4A.

That would irrigate 70,000 acres of land with water from Banks Lake, resulting in an extra 3.1 feet off the top in August each year, over and above what is currently drawn down.

The study identifies several "adverse impacts" on recreation in Banks Lake, including loss of the use of boat ramps for one to four weeks, loss of three of four swimming areas for about six weeks and exposure of boating hazards

for four to seven weeks.

The Center for Environmental Law & Policy and Sierra Club's Columbia River Future Project criticized the plan Friday, charging that a lack of transparency in the Bureau's overall piecemeal approach to planning, and that it's a "water grab" to divert more water from the river even though a treaty with Canada set to expire in 2024 will likely greatly alter operations at Grand Coulee Dam.

Reclamation can issue a Record of Decision 30 days after its published in the Federal Register.

Police, sheriff, farmer team up for manhunt

A Wenatchee man who walked away from an Okanogan County Jail work release program was spotted by local police in the Lakeview Terrace Mobile Home Park area and chased into the tall sagebrush by Grand Coulee officers before he got away, temporarily, last Thursday.

The fugitive, Nathaniel David Smallbeck, 18, was later apprehended by Okanogan County Sheriff officers on farmland at the top of the hill off the highway to Wilbur.

Grand Coulee Police Sgt. John Tufts picked up the pursuit last Thursday about 9:30 a.m. and was later joined by Police Chief Mel Hunt.

Tufts yelled at Smallbeck to stop, but the suspect vaulted over the guardrail and then over a barbed wire fence and into six-foot tall sagebrush. Tufts followed him but couldn't pick up his trail, and Hunt, who was trying to watch the pair through field glasses and was in contact with Tufts by phone, couldn't follow the suspect because the sagebrush was too tall and thick.

Okanogan County Sheriff Frank T. Rogers, Undersheriff Joe Somday and Chief Criminal Deputy Dave Rodriguez arrived at the scene, where Somday and Rodriguez decided to hike up the ridges that led to the wheat fields to see if they could turn up any

sign of Smallbeck. Rogers was scanning the area with field glasses.

At about 4:15 p.m., a farmer, Jared Eagle, spotted Smallbeck heading by foot toward Wilbur and informed the Okanogan law enforcement team. Somday spotted the suspect about 1,000 yards away and Eagle drove officers through the wheat field with his 4x4 vehicle "at a pretty good clip," Rogers said.

The officers raced to Smallbeck's location and the escapee dropped to the ground. Somday said later that Smallbeck was so shocked he had the "deer in the headlights look" when they got to him.

He was returned to Okanogan, where he was booked into jail.

Smallbeck stated that for the past two days he had been hiking on roads and going across country, trying to get to Spokane. He said he didn't think anyone would chase him up the hills out of the coulee area.

Smallbeck and several other prisoners had been on a work release project at the Okanogan County Fairgrounds when he decided to leave the group.

Sheriff Rogers credited Eagle with his alertness and help in capturing Smallbeck.

"All the credit goes to Mr. Jared Eagle," Rogers said. "He spotted Smallbeck, notified us and actually assisted us in the arrest, ... we are extremely grateful for his assistance and his willingness to help."

A bulldozer and brush trucks secured a fire line in the sage at the rock cut's north side to protect property, including two outbuild-

ings and a home there.

Winds were light or still, and with temperatures in the mid 70s, firefighters appeared to have the blaze close to contained by 8:15.

Reportedly, no structures were burned, but officials could not be reached for details after the fire.

Little girl needs new bone marrow

A registry drive for a bone marrow transplant will begin this week for a 6-year-old Coulee Dam girl, Jezelle Elizabeth Marconi.

Jezelle Elizabeth has been diagnosed with aplastic anemia, which gives her a deficiency of red and white blood cells and platelets.

She is the daughter of Randi and Urisha "Ookie" Marconi and a member of the Colville Confederated Tribes.

Four registry drives will be held this week in an attempt to find a bone marrow donor for the girl:

- 7 p.m. tonight (Sept. 5) at Center Elementary in Grand Coulee,
- 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Thursday, Sept. 6, at Nespelem Community Center;
- 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Friday, Sept. 7, at Inchelium Community Center; and
- Saturday, Sept. 8, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Omak Community Center.

The disease leaves Elizabeth

very fatigued and at risk for infections, officials stated.

If a donor is found, the bone marrow transplant will be done at the Children's Hospital in Seattle.

To be a donor you need to be between the ages of 18-60, and be willing to donate to any patient in need.

Patients are most likely to match someone who shares their heritage — in this case, a Native American.

Appointments are being taken at each location and you can do so by calling Lori Joseph at 634-2943.

At the marrow drive this week, officials will be testing your DNA with a Q-Tip. The DNA is then checked to see if there is a match, which takes a few weeks. Younger donors give patients a better outcome so those who are younger, but over 18, are encouraged to have themselves checked.

Port spends another \$6,000 on golf course

Grant County Port District 7 put another \$6,000 into Banks Lake Golf Course's operation during the month of August.

It was one of the golf course's better operating months, and there are still two months to go before the end of the season.

Receipts for August at the golf course totaled about \$12,500, port commissioners learned last Thursday night.

The port district has invested nearly \$110,000 in its promise to keep the course open this year.

While there has been some discussion about the next golf season, the fact remains that the Port District doesn't have the financial power to do it alone. The port's coffers are at \$43,000, down from \$49,000 a month ago.

Commissioners hold hope that a number of special tournaments scheduled during September and October will allow the course to meet its obligations without further drain on port money.

The course now has 82 members and recently executed some reductions in staff expenses.

Energy grant applied for again schools

McKinstry, a company that had helped Grand Coulee Dam School District with an energy conservation grant that was finally tanked, is trying again.

This time, district Superintendent Dennis Carlson told board members, would be for a \$714,000 grant for energy conservation and upgrading for the present Lake Roosevelt High School gymnasium and industrial arts building.

The previous energy conservation grant, which was approved, was turned back because it had been granted for Center Elementary and the Grand Coulee Dam Middle School, as well as parts of Lake Roosevelt, but the district will combine those schools into one in 2014. The grant was applied for before the district knew for sure that it would receive funding for the new school.

The new grant, which the board asked Carlson to pursue with McKinstry, would equip the gym with a modern digital control system that allows for enhanced equipment

scheduling and energy savings controls. The grant would also make necessary light improvements in the gym.

Almost half of the grant would go toward updating the heating, ventilating and air conditioning system in the industrial arts building.

The current HVAC system was installed when the arts building was constructed, and suffers from hot and cold air dumping into the shop as the electric heating coil doesn't modulate. Equipment is

visibly in a state of deterioration.

The industrial arts building would also get a lighting upgrade. Cost for the Industrial arts upgrade would be \$394,000, the estimate shows.

The estimate for the gym upgrade would be about \$275,000.

The district would have to provide a 50-percent match of a project that it planned to do as part of the building project.

Carlson is supposed to report back to the board on the energy grant.

Woman hit by truck in Delano

A Grand Coulee woman was struck by a truck Friday while walking on Alcan Road and flown by helicopter to Spokane for treatment, but may face drug charges when she returns.

The truck was driven by Wayne Fowler, 58, who said that Angette Joy Obendorf, 33, was talking on a cell phone and just stepped in front of his vehicle on the "s curves" on Alcan Road.

Fowler loaded Obendorf into his vehicle and took her to Coulee Medical Center's emergency room, where she resisted treatment and hospital authorities contacted the police.

While placing Obendorf into a hospital gown, medical staff found three baggies with drugs taped to

her chest a police report stated.

Police took the drugs, which tested positive as methamphetamines, into evidence and are requesting that the county prosecutor file charges of possession of a controlled substance against Obendorf.

Fowler showed police a small dent in the hood of his vehicle where he struck the woman.

Police stated that Obendorf suffered possible head and other injuries. She will be charged later, police stated.



Re: "Principal duties to be shared at Center School"

Granted, splitting the principal duties between several individuals doesn't seem ideal, I find it more concerning that some of the school board seem to be ignoring an upcoming problem. With the new school being constructed I question how administration of the new school will be conducted. Will the new two winged school be in need of three principals? It seems like overkill in the administration department, and with the going pay rate of principals, a little expensive too. In light of Hinton's dismissal, the school board should be taking the opportunity to adjust in way that will be more practical once the new school is complete. It seems pretty obvious to most, and given conversations I have had with others in the community, that one of the principals would have been deemed surplus in the near future. Does the school board really want to hire someone temporarily, with the understanding that they would be given their walking papers in less than two years?

Susan Chaffee's comment of "... at what peril?" in reference to the added duties to Lakin, Carlson and

the two lead teachers seemed a bit naïve. Temporarily added duties occur all the time in the working world. While these duties might not be a stress-free experience, other individuals have survived. Personally, I am proud of those who are stepping up to the plate to help out Center Elementary, and I have confidence in their ability to adjust. Instead, I believe that the money that would be used to pay a temporary principal should be used in a way that would be beneficially to the students. I understand that conducting the everyday administration of the elementary, added to their current duties, would be a burden to several people. Yet in light of the struggling economy and tight funds of the school district, I think money could be shifted to address an immediate problem at Center Elementary.

My youngest son is starting kindergarten this year. While he enjoyed his Slow Start visit, it came to my attention that the two kindergarten classes are packed (29 in one class and 28 in the other). It also came to my attention that the

Nespelem School District is suffering from an over abundance of kindergartners as well, so there is no room for overflow there. The teaching staff at Center is wonderful, but with 57 new kindergartners and potentially more, it seems the school board could use the available funds to hire another teacher. The benefits of smaller class sizes have been widely published and include more individual time with a teacher, which helps to promote better individual self-esteem and overall success in students.

Instead of quibbling over whether or not to hire another principal, something that will be a moot point once the new school is finished, I think the school board should be addressing the academic needs of students. City should reconsider on car tab fee



Gorillas sink Raiders in season opener

The Raiders were stymied by The Davenport Gorillas' rushing attack and stiff defense stymied the Lake Roosevelt Raiders last Friday as Davenport cruised to a 44-13 home victory.

It was the Raiders' season opener as LR had pulled out of the Aug. 27 Bridgeport Jamboree because of eligibility issues.

LR opened the scoring on the second play of Friday's game as Davenport bit on the fake, allowing Justus DeWinkler to break free for a 43-yard touchdown run.

The Gorillas responded quickly on the next series lining up in a modified double wing and proceeded to pound the ball down field for the touchdown, then an immediate two-point conversion to put them up 8-7.

For the rest of the first half, the Raider offense was unable to drive the ball into the red zone against the 5-3 defense Davenport employed. Raider Coach Steve Files even kept the offense in on fourth downs in the first quarter trying to see if the Gorillas would flinch and allow the Raiders to regain the momentum.

Beginning in the second quarter, the Raider punt team was sent out on fourth downs as the Gorillas scored quickly after the previously failed fourth down conversions. LR did have some big runs, and Austin Rosenbaum connected with Kyle Holt for a 48-yard pass.

On defense, the Raiders had a hard time tackling throughout the game. Davenport running backs gained yards after high Raider hits that allowed Gorillas legs to keep pumping.

"We need to focus on team defense," Files said, "everyone executing their assignments properly, improve our blocking across the board, and shore up our kick coverages."

After an interception for a touchdown late in the second quarter, the score at halftime was Davenport 30, LR 7. The Raiders' second-half kickoff was returned 60 yards for a touchdown and a two-point conversion to put the score at 38-7.

The Raider offense continued to be stymied until late in the third quarter. Quarterback Austin Rosenbaum sat out a series with a leg cramp after a collision on a punt return. Freshman Chance Garvin stepped in and led the Raiders down to the one-yard line, where DeWinkler punched it in for the final touchdown of the night.

"Our team stuck together, fought hard, and didn't quit," Files noted. "We made some adjustments at halftime and played them pretty even in the second half. Broke some big plays running and passing. Our defense got stronger as the game went on."

Freshmen Garvin and Bryson Goggles stepped up to fill varsity roles in their first high school game, and DeWinkler ran for over 100 yards in the game.

"Dewinkler had a solid all-around game on offense," Files said, "ran with authority and also contributed a couple good runbacks."

The Raiders look to get the first win of 2012 at home Saturday against the Seattle Lutheran Saints in an afternoon game starting at 1:30 p.m.

The Saints are also coming off a 48-21 loss in their opener to Graham High School of Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada.

"We are a talented team, but young," Files commented. "We expect to make significant improvement every week. I am very pleased with the work our players have put in so far. I'm proud of our guys and excited for the opportunity to play Seattle Lutheran this Saturday."

And while I was somewhat surprised at the level of involvement required for preschool, I was excited at the same time. This is a new era, for our world and for our family. Certainly when I was in school, background checks were not required of parents. But I would far rather fill out some extra paperwork and ensure the safety of our children

in this modern era than the alternative. Like children, we parents must adapt as well.

As I kissed my daughter goodbye, I was attentive of what I was sending her into. A world where every day her mind will expand, bending to absorb all the educational and social experiences school will give her. I am also aware that I send her out into a world that is no longer within my control. This is not the first time she has not been beneath my supervision, but as a stay-at-home-mom I am accustomed to having a level of management over her experiences. I am aware that this first day of school is not just a milestone for her, but one for me as well. If parenting is a gradual give and take between preparing your children for the world and then letting them go, then this is a start for me as well.

Since my daughter is only 3, and this is only preschool, the importance of this day in her life is probably far over her head. For her, it's an exciting day to meet new friends, sit in a circle on a colorful carpet, sing songs and play games. But for me, it's also a new beginning, and maybe, a little bit of an end too.
