A pickup crashed through a chain-link fence and caused several thousand dollars of damage to a business and residence in Electric City in the middle of the night last Thursday.

A police report on the crash stated that the vehicle, a 2009 Toyota Tacoma pickup, was found embedded in the side of the residence at 8 Coulee Boulevard, after hitting the corner of the structure, smashing a dumpster and crashing through a steel fence. The structure houses a tanning parlor and a residence.

The collision happened about about 1 a.m. last Thursday morn-

The vehicle was registered to Samuel T. Halverson, 27, who gave his residence as Grand Coulee, the report stated. He had been near that location earlier and returned home with another person, leaving his keys behind.

Later that day, Halverson reported to police that his vehicle had been stolen.

Police Sgt. Gary Moore said Monday that the accident was

still under investigation and the occupants of the vehicle at the time of the accident were unknown.

"I have great faith in the Grand Coulee Police Department and that they will find out who is responsible," commented Lynette P. Zierden, owner of the property. She said that after the crash she heard male voices, but by the time she got outside they were gone.

Zierden said that at the time of the crash, she was wearing headphones and didn't hear anything. But she immediately heard from a friend nearby who said it sounded "like an explosion."

The driver of the pickup had been headed south on SR-155 and attempted to turn left onto Western Avenue, apparently losing control and hitting the Zierden property.

The pickup ended up in the closet area of Zierden's bedroom, tossing items all over.

Some of the items belonged to her late mother and this was a personal loss, Zierden explained.

The vehicle was removed by Jeff's Towing and placed into evidence by police.

Town gets major grant for streets

Coulee Dam will get some major road and sidewalk work done as a result of a state grant that will pay for most of it in 2018.

The state Department of Transportation announced last week it has awarded a \$794,566 grant from the Transportation Improvement Board for work Mayor Greg Wilder called the "centerpiece of several significant projects" the town is planning for the future.

The project includes street surface work on Civic Way, Cedar Street, Tulip Street and Crest

The exact elements of the project will be determined after a session with the town council next Monday night, Wilder stated.

The project will include handicapped-related sidewalk work,

signage and parking, and improve traffic flow around the school, Wilder stated. There could be some realignment on one of the streets, Wilder pointed

In his letter to the TIB board members, Wilder wrote: "A lot has changed within our Town recently, including the consolidation of three disparately located schools into one new K-12 complex. As it is, this new complex is virtually surrounded by an arterial-class road loop. The road surface conditions vary on each segment as do the adequacy and conditions of the pedestrian & handicapped sidewalks, ramps and such. There are an increased level of traffic, increased structural loading from delivery vehicles, school bus utilization and safety risks. And clearly there will be a significant increase for

Elmer City to get state road funds

Elmer City was selected to receive a "chip seal" grant from the state Department of Transportation, city officials learned Monday.

The Transportation Improvement Board grant is for \$82,705, and funds will be available in 2018 for a project on Elmer City Access Road.

"We were happy to receive the grant news," public works director Jimmer Tillman stated.

Tillman said there are some extreme cracks on the road, and the grant will enable the town to

improve the road condition. Elmer City had asked for \$151,000 for the chip seal grant,

but was awarded \$82,705. Two other local municipalities, Electric City and Grand Coulee, put in for similar chip seal grants but were not selected in this announcement.

Elmer City was also nominated by the TIB for a "Complete Streets" grant.

Eighty small cities in the state were nominated for the grant, including three from Okanogan County; Elmer City one of them. Twisp and Winthrop were also nominated.


Nominations can come from a variety of agencies.

"The award on the Complete Street grants will be made in January," Tillman stated.

The Complete Streets grants are for \$250,000 and can be used for any type of street programs.

"They give you three years to use the grant money," Tillman stated.

Tribes announce member payments from settlement

An amount equal to the Colville Tribes' "Ramah settlement" will be distributed to Tribal members through per capita payments on December 5, Colville Business Council Chairman Dr. Michael Marchand said last week.

"The Colville Business Council has determined that a per capita distribution in an amount equal to the Tribes' Ramah settlement funds will be made to our Tribal members," Marchand said. "We intend to take that step as soon as possible.

The Tribes' share of the Ramah settlement, reached in the class action case of Ramah Navajo Chapter, et.al. v. Sally Jewell, is approximately \$13.4 million. The CBC Management and Budget Committee today approved per capita payments of \$1,410 for each enrolled Colville member, subject to routine "holds," such as court-ordered child support payments and reimbursements to Children and Family Services and Social Services programs.

Group meets on sidewalk problem in Coulee Dam

A group of some 22 Coulee Dam citizens met in Electric City Monday night, intent on allying in an effort to impress their town council to fix the side-

The issue of fixing sidewalks has been gaining attention since Fred Netzel, who called the meeting, decided to walk the town and gather signatures on a letter about them.

It's an issue Mayor Greg Wilder readily acknowledges is serious. But the group meeting at the Vets Hall Monday doubts that Wilder's approach to tackle it is the best one. They want a quicker fix for the worst problems, not necessarily a perfect one.

Former town council member Bob Poch recalled that in the past the town's crew has fixed tree-rootcaused upheavals by simply lifting the broken slab, cutting the roots and replacing them. He said in the 1960s and '70s, the town would hire a couple of high school kids to help with such extra tasks. "Not quite to the exacting specs that we've seen

in the last contracts," Poch said, "but the job lasted for 15 to 20 years. ... It could be done for a heck of a lot less than 500 grand."

That's the upper limit of Wilder's broad estimate

of the money needed to fix all the sidewalks in town, which he thinks should be done before turning responsibility for their maintenance over to adjacent property owners, as state law specifies.

"That's going to be the argument," noted Netzel, "that we should spend \$500,000 right now to make all of these problems go away ... as opposed to ...

tackle the worst of them." Some speakers were wary of the possibility of passing a fee or tax to address the problem, saying that could be a hardship on people with low, fixed incomes. And Netzel was leary of seeking a levy vote that might not pass.

Those are the kinds of policy decisions the town council will have to make, which the group left intent on influencing. They plan on making sure several of them show up at each town council meeting to press the point that cracks with slabs jutting several inches up are "a lawsuit waiting to happen" and that they would rather fix the worst problems now and tackle the rest a little at a time with the town's own labor, not hire a contractor and engineer.

Wilder says the town crew can start fixing some problems now, but that they could all be fixed as early as next summer, if the people want to approve one of several funding possibilities.

Moses Lake firm to tow local cars for city

The city of Grand Coulee has signed an impound agreement with Moses Lake Towing.

Mayor Paul Townsend said Tuesday that the city now has the ability to get rid of abandoned cars on city streets.

The agreement allows Moses Lake Towing to pick up reported abandoned vehicles and charge the registered owners any fees connected to the impound. The notification for impound service will come from the city's code enforcement officer or the police department, Townsend said.

Under the agreement, Moses Lake Towing will be free to pursue collection of charges and costs under Washington State Patrol rules.

Townsend said that the city has been reluctant to pursue impounding cars until an agreement could be reached that frees the city from any ensuing costs.

The agreement also allows Moses Lake Towing to refuse an impound if there is no value to the vehicle, or if hazardous waste is associated with it.

According to the city code, vehicles can only be parked on the streets for a 24-hour period without being moved.

Townsend said that police can report infractions, but the code enforcer is more likely to identify

violators because the code enforcer patrols the streets on a regular

"If you sell a car and you are the registered owner, you still are responsible for the impound fee,"

Townsend warned. "Make sure that you complete all the paperwork on the sale of your vehicle, or you could be facing a charge if the vehicle is abandoned and im-

Ambulance calls may hit 400 this year


Grand Coulee Volunteer Fire Chief Richard Paris advised the council last week that ambulance calls will likely hit 400 for the year.

He said that as of Nov. 15 the department had answered 347 calls, about normal. Paris also reported that during the month of October the depart-

ment had 34 calls, including five in Coulee Dam and 21 in Grand Coulee. He said the ambulance had eight calls to transport patients.

The department had three fire calls: a trailer fire, a fuel spill and an active-shooter drill at Coulee Medical Center.

Paris said the department will hold its annual Awards Night Dec.

On sidewalks, streets, and petitions

over 80 years ago and we can't expect that the infrastructure will last forever... and that includes our sidewalks. So for now, let's skip the myriad of other issues/ problems and let's look at our sidewalks. At first, the Town just presumed that each of us "homeowner's" would be required to individually repair the (their) sidewalks – and that was (and still is) a requirement of state statutes (laws). However, as is usually the case, assumptions and perceptions are usually interpreted as a requirement for someone else! And, in 1991, we found a solution – let's pass a new local law such that the "Town" should pay for these sidewalks repair. In the end, neither the individual homeowner nor the town could keep up with repair requirements.

We are aware of the issues and problems and risks... AND we have a lot of solutions and even more "opinions." The town isn't sleeping through a resolution – the town has an on-going

Most of the Town was built and proactive program. Just consider that Mayor Snow put a lot of time and political effort to fund a number of grants, for the issue. If you consider the past ten years, Snow's administration garnered over \$500,000 (the value of about \$74,000 per year) just to deal with sidewalks. And given all of those naysayers and opinions, there is a bright light at the end of the tunnel.


> In one way or another, most of us organize our wants and needs for our budget priorities. For my way of thinking, I tend to view funding and projects from a holistic paradigm. As an example, over the past few years we have been working and refining a phased comprehensive plan & design for a managed project that includes sidewalks, streets, curbs, storm drainage, plowing/sweeping designs, traffic calming, intersection realignments, ADA (handicap) mitigations, street lighting, safe crosswalks, etc. We need more remediation than just sidewalks. AND given this approach, the

Washington State Transportation Improvement Board (TIB) just announced that they awarded Coulee Dam \$794,566 for an \$836,385 project. If you are aware of small city/town street/sidewalk project grants, you will note that this is very significant grant... compare, if you wish. And while we are working for other grantfunded projects, we hope that the Town Council will approve a comprehensive Local Improve District (LID) or some other such instrument... adding a new household tax of between \$8.50 and \$10.00 (depending on bond rates & costs) per month for each over the next ten years. Done in this approach, we can accomplish this comprehensive sidewalk program in a year or two.

AND, in spite of our squabbles, we will reinvent to accommodate!


Nick will continue to be the
