Grant PUD passes budget

EPHRATA, Wash. - Following recent public hearings, Grant PUD commissioners approved a \$247.4 million budget for 2014 during their regular business meeting on Tuesday.

The budget includes significant dollars for capital projects associated with the PUD's federal license and aging equipment, the PUD said in a press release. Some of this work includes:

- Generator replacements at Wanapum Dam
- Hatchery site improvements and construction
- Recreation site enhancements
- On-going electric system reliability improvements

"This budget balances our operational needs while also being considerate of present and future customers," said Commission President Terry Brewer. "Our mission focuses on providing reliable, low-cost energy for our customers; this budget allows us to make it happen."

Childrens' play was a hit

Local PTA officials are already making plans to have another Missoula Children's Theater performance next year.

"Blackbeard the Pirate," put on in two performances Saturday, attracted enough theater fans to encourage officials to look forward to another run in 2014.

PTA Vice President Crystal Jones said Monday that she was pleased with Saturday's performances, when 32 children from local schools, kindergarten through the sixth grade, participated.

She said that Missoula Children's Theater dates for the new season are usually set in April.

Jones said it isn't known what play will be available for the new season. The Blackbeard production

is an original, written for the Missoula group, whose directors travel around the country putting on such plays in local communities.

Jones said she has had good feedback from parents, students and those who attended the performances.

The MCT charges \$2,750, and the owner of the Grand Gallery Theater gave the group a reduced rate for using the facility, Jones said. The LDS Church provided the refreshments that were on sale Saturday.

The two representatives from MCT, Jessica Eisenberg and Chris Chamblee, started the process last Monday with auditions, then immediately started practices. Practices were held from 3-8 p.m. each day throughout the week.

The MCT provided sets and costumes and assisted in the presentation of the play.

Coulee Medical Center going for zero in 2014

The public hospital district that runs Coulee Medical Center is aiming for zero next year.

That is, a net gain of nothing on its bottom line, which would be an improvement over this year and last.

Commissioners for Douglas, Grant, Lincoln, Okanogan Hospital District 6 approved a budget Oct. 30 that sets out that break-even goal on total patient

revenues of \$37.3 million, which gets cut to \$22.9 million after adjustments for Medicare, Medicaid and insurance payers, charity care, bad debts and other deductions.

The hospital is on track to lose \$286,000 by year's end, according to the budget prepared by Chief Financial Officer Joe Vessey, far less than the \$1.8 million loss in 2012 that included accounting for a buildup of uncollectible accounts.

This year's loss will amount to about 1.3 percent of what the hospital takes in.

Some \$23.9 million in expenses listed include \$15.4 million for payroll and benefits, contracted labor and professional fees.

Projected non-operating revenues include \$487,000 in investment income, slightly less than the \$551,000 expected for 2013.

Vessey reported a net gain of \$82,743 for September, almost \$20,000 above budget, but a year-

Mechanics' argument scheduled for court

A Grand Coulee man cited for operating a business in a residential district without a license may get his day in court soon.

Donovan Picard, of 431 Grand Coulee Avenue, could argue his case before municipal court judge Richard Fitterer as early as Friday, Nov. 22.

Picard has been served a citation with a penalty of \$750 by Grand Coulee Police, telling him to cease repairing vehicles at his home garage in violation of the city's ordinances.

Two mechanic firms in Grand Coulee, MPH and Jack's Service, had complained to the city council back in September that Picard

was running a business without a city license and in a residential area not zoned for business.

Picard received the citation and immediately informed the city that he would argue his case in municipal court.

A city official said Grand Coulee's attorney would be on hand for the court session. However, Police Chief Mel Hunt said the court date would likely be re-scheduled to January next year.

Picard has said that he did do repair work at his home garage, but it was primarily for relatives and friends.

The city wasn't buying this and instructed Hunt to issue Picard a citation. The citation was for \$750, part for not having a busi-

ness license, part for the zoning violation.

City Clerk Carol Boyce said the fine for not operating a business without license is \$250. The penalty for having a business in a residential zone is \$500 per day. Each day is a new violation, she stated.

Since Picard has decided to fight the citation, its penalties will not be applied until after the court session.

A neighbor, Mike Graves, in a letter to the editor about the operation, said he didn't have any problem with Picard doing repair work. He stated that there were no advertising signs out front, no long line of cars, and that Picard does exceptional repair work.

Elmer City mayor's race too close to call

With just over 300 ballots in Okanogan County left to count, the mayoral race in Elmer City is the closest local race in last week's election, hanging by one vote.

If the current count holds, there will be a turnover in the mayor's office as challenger and sitting council member Gail Morin will have defeated current Mayor Mary Jo Carey, 43-42.

County elections officer Mila Jury said Tuesday that only the mayoral race in Pateros is closer, tied at 71 votes each for Gail Howe and write-in candidate Liberty Harrison.

Jury said the elections board will continue to accept mailed-in ballots until the day before official certification of the results on Nov.

26.

Carey had served two full terms as mayor and was trying for her third term.

Morin had served on the council a few years ago and was elected back to the council two years ago.

Morin has been active in the Coulee Dam wastewater treatment plant dispute and had lent support to an effort to delay the project and perhaps relocate the site. One of Morin's goals was to get Coulee Dam to refigure how it charged Elmer City residents for sewer service. She would take over in January.

In the single Elmer City council race that was contested, incumbent Larry Holford retained his seat over challenger Joaquin Marchand, 53-27.

Coulee Dam votes mean new leadership

There will be a new mayor and two new council members in Coulee Dam, all defeating incumbents, vote totals as of last Friday show.

The new mayor will be Gregory Wilder, who defeated longtime Mayor Quincy Snow, 231-107.

New council members will be Gayle Swagerty who defeated incumbent Karl Hjørten, 206-104; and Duane Johnson, who won over Andrew Trader, 226-83.

All take office in January.

The three new leaders had joined in the effort to derail the Coulee Dam wastewater treatment plant project seeking a delay and possible relocation.

They had argued that Coulee Dam residents did not have ample time to comment on the project and that the plant remodeling plan was flawed and much too costly.

Lates vote counts show solid elections

Local rodeo named best in state

The Colorama Rodeo was named "Rodeo of the Year" for the second time in a row at a meeting of the Pro-West Rodeo Association last Saturday night.

The award was announced at the association's annual awards banquet in the Tri-Cities area.

George Kohout, president of the Ridge Riders, said that he was pleased with the announcement. Kohout is in his second year as president of the group, and was honored by the chamber of commerce as "Achiever of the Year" for his activity on behalf of the Ridge Riders.

"We could never have done this without the support of Electric City, Grand Coulee and Coulee Dam," Kohout stated Tuesday.

The three municipalities contributed hotel/motel tax revenues to the Ridge Riders to promote the rodeo and other events staged by the group.

"The support of the three towns enabled us to advertise the rodeo and attract both fans and cowboys," Kohout said.

Electric City gave \$5,300; Coulee Dam gave \$5,500; and Grand Coulee gave \$6,500.

The Ridge Riders also put on a riding clinic, a ranch rodeo and a special bull riding event.

Bomb threat shuts reservation store

Colville Tribal police received a possible bomb threat Friday at 3:30 p.m., at Tribal Trails gas station at Barney's Junction near Kettle Falls, also known as "Noisy Waters."

Tribal officers were dispatched, along with Ferry County deputies, and the building was evacuated and the perimeter around the building secured.

A caller had stated that a bomb would go off within the hour.

Washington State Patrol was

notified, and a portion of SR-20 was shut down. Stevens County Emergency Services were also placed on standby. A bomb squad for the area was notified and would have been called in if any suspicious objects had been found.

Colville Tribal Police and Ferry County deputies waited un-

til after the specified time, then searched the area but didn't find anything.

The investigation is continuing and Tribal Police are asking for assistance in identifying a man and woman who left the station just before officers arrived. They are wanted for questioning only, the report stated.

Resort hires new manager team

And, regardless of the testy campaign rhetoric, it is also a time to honor the 16 years Mayor Snow has served us.



Horse rescue operation bound to grow

A horse's story can be hard to tell and even harder to listen to. These horses have horrible stories of abuse, neglect, abandonment and starvation. But that is all changing for a few of them. Buddy, Silver, Snickers, Baby and Reme all have very different tails of how they got to Delano, Wash., and fell into the hands of Chris Holeman and his group of dedicated, passionate, hand picked helpers at "Nourishing Hands."

The horse rescue operation held a thank-you barbecue for volunteers and supporters last Saturday at the Ridge Riders clubhouse, where they talked about their equine passions.

For instance, Buddy, the group's first rescue: Buddy "spurred the idea" of doing a horse rescue here in the Coulee. When Buddy arrived, he was skin and bones. He came from a racetrack that used him

as a pace horse until he wasn't needed any more. Buddy is a big horse, the biggest some have ever worked with. The sad thing about Buddy is he has no gallop and that makes him very hard to ride.

There is also Silver's story of being just a few hundred yards from a slaughter house most of his life. Silver was a mistake from a thoroughbred breeder, an accident that was not wanted. Very little human contact and never having been ridden has made Silver spooky and skittish toward people. But he is getting better.

Snickers, the oldest of the bunch at 30 years, has eyes of two different colors and one pupil in the shape of a heart. Reme came from a drug addict who simply didn't want the horses anymore.

And then there is Baby, a 13-year-old mare who was part of a wild horse roundup, skinny and in shock when she arrived. But Baby is not that way anymore. As a matter of fact, she is fed well, by looking at her. She is wanted, too. Chris and his wife Jamie were going to adopt her, but now a family from Wilbur will be taking her and expanding the rescue program up the hill.

Three kids from the Wilbur school district are participating in the program and have fallen in love with Baby. Logan, 12; Colby, 11; and Truly, 8; have only been

to the rescue a few times, but you can see the twinkle in their eyes whenever they talk about the horses or all the hard work that goes into all this.

My buddy Mike Williams has also benefited from the program, and is so excited that he brought his buddy D.J. to the benefit dinner. Both are excited to try something

new. But here is what excites me the most about what I saw: Chris Holman's passion for seeing this need and going "all in." This is just the beginning of this program. The ACH, Wilbur and Nespelem school districts are already on board, while the GCD district is still working out legalities.

Kids are getting to love on animals that need love. Wounded Warriors from Fairchild are interested in what's going on down here. If you just listen to Chris for a little while, you will feel his passion and want to jump on board too. I have a feeling that this is going to be a success.

It's going to get bigger too. Chris, Jamie, Heather, TJ, Gary,

Judah, and many others have done a lot of work — I mean, more work than we will ever know — to get this horse rescue where it is today. But the work is not done. With more horses expected to show up at any time and more horses out there that need a good home, I don't see this going away anytime soon.

For one thing, Chris won't let it. Neither will the kids that are getting hands-on experience. Neither will the wounded warriors that will show up later. Neither will the horses, horses that now know what love and responsibility looks and feels like.

These horses fell into good hands, nourishing hands. And this program will help many. Kids, adults and horses in need all serving each other to heal each other.

There is more work to be done. Hay is a big need. I challenge you to drop off some at the rescue site, when you are passing through with your load. Youth saddles are also needed. Even if you just give an hour out of your day to help groom a horse, or just go up and talk to them.

So, Coulee, get ready to saddle up, 'cause this program is going big time and we need to support it. All of us have scars inside and out, horses included. Let's help each other.

Raider cross country finished the 2013 season on a strong note at the state race in Pasco last Saturday.

Raider Head Coach Gary Darnold liked the effort from the boys' team and the two girls competing.

"Both girls and five of the boys PR'd at state, which shows that all of the runners pushed themselves to their maximum," Darnold said.

The Raider boys finished 15th overall with 377 points.

Ray Yazzie again led the Raider boys, finishing with a career 5,000-meter personal record time of 18 minutes, 59 seconds.

Dominick Cotton was second for LR, also finishing with a career PR for 5,000 meters at 19:26.

Third across the line for LR was Coltin Williams, who finished his first cross country season with a career 5,000-meter PR at the state race in 19:58.

Brandon Desautel finished his

LR career on a high note crossing the line fourth for the team with a career PR at the state race in 20:10. Fifth to cross the finish for LR was Jerry Palmer, in 20:19, a career PR. Robert George was sixth for LR with the time of 21:13.

The seventh Raider racing at state was Daniel Cam-pobasso, who finished with a time of 22:06.

"Our boys have a very strong group with now having state experience to build on," commented the coach, noting that only two of this year's team are seniors. The Raider girls were represented by Ashley Palmer and Alexia Hanway. Palmer, in her first year of high school cross country, finished 22nd overall with the career PR time of 21:42. She was the highest placing Raider for the day.

Raider football wins on Senior Night

The Raiders ended their best football season in nine years last Friday with a win over the Bridgeport Mustangs.

It was the second win over the Mustangs this season and the first league win of the season. Lake Roosevelt finishes the season with a 4-6 overall record and a 1-5 Central Washington 2B record. The four wins makes this the best season for LR since 2004.

The evening started with Senior Night festivities for Thaddeus Richardson and Michael Rounds.

In the first quarter, Bridgeport got on the board first with Garcia running it in from 10 yards out to cap a drive where the Mustangs were able to chip away at the Raiders' defense.

Bridgeport ran a 6-3 defense to challenge the Raiders to throw the ball. LR responded with a touchdown drive of their own, with Josiah Desautel breaking loose for a 37-yard touchdown run.

On the ensuing Mustang drive, Bridgeport tried to convert on fourth down, but was stopped by Rounds, who picked up the fumble he forced. Then, late in the first quarter, Desautel broke loose again with a 76-yard run.

In the second quarter, both squads had trouble with penalties and scoring. Jesse Louie recovered the second Mustang fumble, which led to a fourth down fake by Austin Rosenbaum, who ran the ball inside the Mustang 30. LR could not convert on third down and attempted a 41-yard field goal. The attempt fell just short and to the left. The score at half was LR 14-Bridgeport 7.

Right away in the third quarter, the Raiders scored on another Desautel run. LR went for two but did not convert. Later in the third, the Raiders were forced to punt; the kick was short due to the pressure the Mustangs sent. The ball hit the ground and skipped toward a group of Bridgeport players. LR coaches argued that the ball hit one of the Mustangs and the ball should go back to the Raiders. The officials did not

agree and the Mustangs kept the ball. That placed the Mustangs inside the Raiders 40-yard line.

Bridgeport scored a touchdown on a Morris-Everson one-yard dive to bring them within one score of the lead. On the ensuing kickoff, Desautel returned the ball to midfield where he was horsecollared. At the end of the third it was LR 20-Bridgeport 14.

In the fourth quarter, the Raiders and Mustangs went to the air for their final scores of the game. For the Raiders, it was a rare passing score as Rosenbaum connected on a 20-yard pass, with Desautel pushing the Raider lead to 13.

On the next Mustang drive, Rounds grabbed his second fumble of the game. LR could not convert on the turnover and punted the ball away.

The Mustangs then drove down the field and scored on a 30-yard touchdown pass. Bridgeport did not convert the extra point.

After that score, the Mustangs could not connect on passes and when LR got the ball back they ran out the clock to secure the

win. "We had two hard fought games with Bridgeport this season and were fortunate to win both," commented Raider Head Coach Steve Files.

The Raiders gained a total of 298 yards of offense against the Mustangs, 275 of those on the ground.

Desautel ran for 164 yards on 11 carries and three touchdowns. Rosenbaum gained 54 yards on eight carries and was two for four through the air for 23 yards and a touchdown.

Octavio Alejandro hit all three extra-point kicks. Trey Nicholson led the team again in tackles with 19. Rounds grabbed two fumbles and Jesse Louie picked up another. Louie also had two punts of more than 40 yards.

For seniors Rounds and Richardson, it was a great way to end their Raider careers, Files noted.

"Raider football really means something to these two young men, and it showed in their team-first attitude and effort this sea-

son," Files said. "They anchored our defensive effort versus Bridgeport and will be missed."

Looking ahead to next season, the Raiders want to build on this 4-6 season. "We'll have an experienced team coming back, so I expect us to improve in all phases next year," Files said.

When asked what he wanted to see carry over to next year, Coach Files responded, "our commitment to the team concept."

Files also wanted to thank the community. "I'd like to thank the coaches, players, managers, parents, boosters, and our administration for all their hard work and support," he said.

Looking forward to next season, the new classification cycle could bring big changes for the Raiders. The league could change with Okanogan, Brewster, Tonasket and Entiat rumored to be coming to the 2B ranks. With possible schools in the south dropping to 2B, Lake Roosevelt could be part of a resurrected North Central B League.
