No primary election for Coulee Dam, but three on ballot

One of three candidates withdraws

There will be no primary election for the town of Coulee Dam's town council race, even though three candidates filed their intention to run, according to Mila Jury, elections officer for the Okanogan County Auditor's Office.

That's because those finally filing did not

do so until an extra filing period was declared because no one had filed earlier.

Jury said three names will appear on the November ballot and the county auditor's office will certify one as the winner.

That's true even though one of the three declared last week that he was withdrawing.

Timothy Brooks told The Star that for health reasons he had been advised last week not to run. He said he was withdrawing from the election.

However, it's too late to take his name off

the ballot, Jury said, so voters in Coulee Dam will see three names by Council Dam Town Council Position 3 on their ballots: Brooks, Marcia Warnecke and Bruce Bartoo.

She said if Brooks happened to win, he would be the certified winner of the election and that it would be up to the town council of Coulee Dam to determine his replacement.

"It's one of those weird, odd things," Jury said of the election rules.

Tribal elder warns about Trump as council reorganizes

Chambers dedicated to Boyd

Members of the Colville Confederated Tribes, in a packed room at the Lucy Covington Government Center, heard a retiring elder give advice for the future at the swearing-in ceremony for the new Colville Business Council July 13.

Retiring after 47 years, former vice chairman Mel Tonasket received a traditional retirement blanket and a gift card as a substitute toward a traditional rifle (to laughter and applause) from Chairman Michael Marchand.

Tonasket, who fought termination of the reservation early in his career, warned the new Colville Business Council of serious challenges ahead.

"I want you to understand how serious this business is," Tonasket said. "With Trump in the White House, and Sessions as Attorney General, we are close to termination again today. We don't have logical thinkers (in DC). We are safe now, but will we be safe tomorrow? We have enemies walking the halls of Congress. As long as we have land, water, and sovereignty, people will want our natural resources."

Tonasket encouraged the new council to study the law, and wished them luck in the challenges they'll face in the future.

At the ceremony, the CBC chambers were dedicated to Jim Boyd. Boyd, the former chairman who was first elected in 2012, died unexpectedly in 2016 at the age of 60. His widow, Shelly Boyd, spoke eloquently about him after being presented with a Colville Confederated Tribes flag and the unveiling of a large, framed dedication to Jim Boyd that will hang in the council chambers.

"He really believed in us as people. He had a high regard for work," Shelly Boyd said. "He believed in our creativity and our ability to create beautiful things."

She spoke in traditional language and then translated, saying that the late chairman made decisions by asking himself the questions: "What's best for the land?" "What's best for the water?" "What's best for the natural resources?" and "What's best for the people?"

"Natural resources" isn't a truly accurate translation, she said, explaining that, "taking care of

Fire burns southeast of Keller

A lightning-caused fire burning eight miles southeast of Keller was only 10 percent contained, as of mid-morning on Tuesday.

The 500-acre Redford Canyon fire, located just northeast of where the San Poil river empties into the Columbia, is spreading in a northeast direction toward Whitestone Ridge, burning primarily grass, sage, and timber.

The fire was reported on July 15 at 4:50 a.m., according to a joint press release from the Colville Confederated Tribes and the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Some 250 firefighters are expected on the scene as of Tuesday, July 18, with 14 fire engines, four bulldozers, and one skid engine.

Firefighters are constructing and holding firelines.

Road closures are in place on Nine Mile Road, and Four Cor-

ners Road that goes to the six-mile area, which will be open to residence and logging operations only.

"Boaters along Lake Roosevelt need to be aware of potential helicopters and fixed wing aircraft dipping out of the lake," the press release states. "Please stay clear of areas being used by firefighting aircraft."

Air resources include fixed-wing aircrafts of two Fire Bosses

(a type of seaplane with water scooping capabilities); one SEAT, or Single Engine Air Tanker (an aerial spray plane); two type-1 helicopters (capable of carrying up to 15 passengers and 700 gallons of water); and a type-3 helicopter (capable of carrying four passengers and 100 gallons of water) supporting ground crews.

A command post for fighting the fire has been established at the Keller Community Center.

Postal carrier walks 14 miles a day

So you wish it were the weekend so you could take that hike you've been planning. Well, Shelley Baker is looking forward to the weekend so she won't have to take any more hikes for a couple of days.

Shelley does the postal walking route in Coulee Dam, and is up to 50,000 miles walked in the town.

Anyone beat that?

Shelley has been walking 14 miles every working day for about 14 years.

The U.S. Postal Service has 598 deliverable addresses in the town of Coulee Dam. Shelley delivers to them all, every working day.

Say you are having breakfast and you are dreading work. After all, it can be tiring walking from your desk to the coffee pot several times a day.

Shelley is having breakfast and knows she faces all the "ups and downs" the town can throw at her.

She shows up for work about 7 a.m. to sort the route mail, putting all the pieces in order of delivery. On a recent Monday she had 1,500 letters and 500 catalogs to deliver.

That's to say nothing about the packages.

That's the big change since she started her walking route 14 years ago.

Ordering items over the internet is getting more popular every

year. And it all falls on Shelley to get them delivered.

Her routing calls for her to park her delivery vehicle and walk up and down the streets — every one in town.

Baker gets done about 4 p.m. She would be a good candidate for the University of Oregon track team.

Shoes are always a problem when you do a lot of walking, and in Shelley's case it's something she has to work on constantly. She has been diligent in selecting a good walking shoe.

Shelley goes up and down steps, across lawns where it is appropriate, and could probably walk the route in her sleep.

The postal worker's mother, Margie Gallagher, was a substitute on the very same route years ago.

Postmaster Amy Glover said they advertised for a substitute for Shelley's route once and it took the postal service eight months to find someone.

After all, most people don't walk 14 miles a day.

Shelley grew up in the Grand Coulee area and is a graduate of Lake Roosevelt High School.

Her mother is a graduate of Grand Coulee High School.

Winter is the worst for Shelley; she prefers the hot weather to the cold.

Speed limit uniformity sought through area

Visitors coming into the area from the south on SR-155 could easily get confused as to what the legal speed limit is, says a man who wants to change that and open intercity road travel to off-road vehicles.

In the course of about five miles the speed limit changes five times, in some cases within a mile.

Electric City resident Ron Pulsipher wants to do something about it and is scheduled to try his luck with the city council at its next meeting, Aug. 8.

You are driving toward town at the 60 mph limit and as you approach the turnoff to the golf course the limit changes to 50 mph. At the end of the causeway, and entering the main part of Electric City, the limit changes again to 35 mph.

In about a mile, near the entrance to Coulee Playland, the limit goes up to 45 mph until it changes again, this time to 30 miles an hour, close to the Four-Corners intersection with SR-174.

Pulsipher thinks it would be safer for all motorists if the speed limit was consistent from the north end of the causeway all the way through Coulee Dam.

Pulsipher appeared at July's city council meeting and asked that he be put on the agenda in August so he could discuss the speed limit fiasco, as he sees it.

He also has appeared at Grand Coulee's council and was instrumental in getting the city to write an ordinance that allows side-by-side off-road vehicles to travel on city streets.

He would like to see the speed consistent so that people could ride their side-by-sides, if made street legal, to travel between the two cities and maybe all the way to the golf course.

Electric City passed an ordinance over a year ago that allows city dwellers to drive such vehicles on city streets as long as they have lights, direction signals and are licensed by the state.

Pulsipher said there are well over 30,000 side-by-sides that are licensed by the state.

In Electric City there was initial concern about allowing the small off-road vehicles the right to travel on city streets. But there have been no problems, and no accidents.

Pulsipher will likely make that point when he appears before the city council Aug. 8.

natural resources is the same as taking care of ourselves. It's not a resource, it's a relationship."

Shelly Boyd also spoke about concerns with the Trump administration. "I feel this lurking at the federal level," Boyd said. "A man named Trump, I really think he doesn't like us. He doesn't want us here. I think that our leaders right there, they need us behind them. They need us pushing them, because they have a lot of hard work in front of them."

Jim and Shelly Boyd's son, Joel, is among those newly elected to the CBC.

The dedication to Boyd closed with a traditional song.

Newly elected members of the CBC are: incumbents Jack Ferguson, Andy Joseph Jr., and Susie Allen, who were sworn in along-

side newcomers Norma Sanchez, Melissa Louis, Rodney Cawston, and Joel Boyd.

The council, composed of 14 members altogether, holds elections for seven positions each year, with members serving two-year terms.

The newly elected join Michael Marchand, Edwin Marchand, Willie Womer, Bessie Simpson, Sheilah Cleveland, Larry Allen, and Joseph Somday, each of whom will be up for re-election next year.

After swearing in, the new council took their seats, and members were then assigned to positions based on votes from the council members themselves.

Michael Marchand will continue as chairman, the only nominee for the position. Edwin Marchand

won the vice chairman position over Jack Ferguson, with an 8-6 vote. Sheilah Cleveland won the secretary position over Melissa Louis, with an 8-6 second vote following a 7-7 tie.

Jack Ferguson will chair the Management & Budget Committee, with an 8-6 decision over Susie Allen following a 7-7 tie. Norma Sanchez is chair of the Tribal Government Committee, winning a 9-5 vote over Joel Boyd. Rodney Cawston chairs the Natural Resources Committee, favored over Joseph Somday 9-4. Joel Boyd won 8-5 over Sheilah Cleveland for the Law & Justice Committee.

Andy Joseph kept the Health & Human Services Committee chairmanship, 7-5-2, over Melissa Louis and Georgia Simpson. Louis chairs the Employment and Education committee after a second vote of 8-6, following a 7-7 tie, over Simpson. Edwin Marchand took the Community Development Committee leadership over Simpson, 9-5. Willie Womer won the Culture Committee chairmanship over Joseph Somday, 9-5. And Larry Allen was uncontested to lead the Veterans Committee.

City hall bid goes to local company

A job of replacing windows and doors at Electric City Hall was awarded to DWK Fowler Construction, a decision made by the council last Tuesday night.

The award teetered between two bids and was awarded to DWK Fowler, a local company, after council members nixed adding a handicapped-accessible door to the project.

Fowler's bid of \$11,588.48 beat out one by Raven Glass, out of Wenatchee. That bid was \$11,976.90.

The project calls for seven new energy-efficient windows and two new doors, and is part of a long-range plan to remodel city hall. This is the last major part of the overhaul, according to city Clerk Russell Powers.

The council looked at this a month ago, but the two firms had bid on different types of windows. In an attempt to get the two

firms bidding on the same type of products, the council asked them to go back to the drawing board and review their bids.

The remodeling of city hall effort started under former mayor Jerry Sands and has systematically continued.

Powers said there might still be some countertops replaced, but the major parts of the remodeling will be over with the addition of the windows and doors.

Street transferred to town

The Grand Coulee Dam School District board Wednesday night gave a "no name" street to the town of Coulee Dam.

The street, which lies near Civic and Pine next to the tennis courts, connects Civic to the highway and is part of the town's upcoming street project funded recently by the Transportation

Improvement Board.

The school owns half the street, a right of way, and has no need to continue to have it in its possession.

"We are not in the street business," Superintendent Paul Turner said last week.

The Wednesday meeting took place because the scheduled meeting last Monday was canceled for

lack of a quorum.

Engineers working on the TIB project learned that part of one of the streets scheduled for major work belonged to the school district. The district wasn't aware that it owned part of the street.

The town had requested that the district act on the street question, to clear up the problem.

Coulee Dam Council: Fix the worst sidewalks now

Two toy trolls may soon be homeless as the result of a town council decision to direct the mayor to get the worst of Coulee Dam's broken sidewalks fixed this year, not later.

The decision was foisted upon Mayor Greg Wilder after he told the council during their regular semi-monthly meeting Wednesday that a planned street and sidewalk project would not start this summer, as had been planned.

Wilder said he'd been informed that day by the state Transportation Improvement Board that bids on the work would not be sought until next March.

Wilder has hoped he would be able to stretch TIB funding on a project on the east side of town for much-needed work on the west side's sidewalks.

But the hefty lifting of concrete accomplished by town-owned ornamental cherry tree roots along Stevens Avenue has had residents grumbling for more than a year.

And at least one resident chose

to illustrate the frustration by using the difference between broken slabs to house two troll dolls, which stand nicely between the upper and lower portions of broken sidewalk, some 6-8 inches apart.

Mention of the trolls got a chuckle Wednesday night, but the council was serious when Councilmember Ben Alling moved to direct the mayor to put up to \$17,500 in the public works department to fix the worst of the problems.

Wilder said it could be done, but would cost three times as

much as waiting for a contractor who would already be working a sidewalk job in town. But he asked the council if anyone wanted to suggest spending \$10,000 now at the discretion of the public works department.

The discussion was spurred by a question from now-candidate Fred Netzel, who asked about appropriated, but unspent, funds for the work. Netzel organized a meeting on the subject, attended by 22 people, last fall.

Alling's motion passed unanimously.

Cracked sidewalks, efficiency and practicality

Efficiency in government is always an important goal, but not always the most important one.

That point was made clear by the Coulee Dam Town Council last week when it directed that the worst of the town's sidewalks should be fixed with money available for it, even if it would cost much more than waiting for a bigger job and higher efficiency.

The vote put an end to a months-long tussle over the subject, which has grown fissures in town politics wider than the cracks in the sidewalks themselves. The mayor has argued that the problem is much larger and more serious than the few sidewalks on which a walker might conceivably injure a shin, so high is the lift from ice and tree roots.

He's right about that, and the town will need to address a long-term solution for funding maintenance of the walkways it took over — but did not keep up — many years ago.

An immediate fix is sorely needed for a few very bad spots, and the council was right to take the mayor up on his question about funding it immediately, which one might suspect he asked hoping no one would respond.

They did, and he promised to implement the direction the council gave.

That will provide some relief on a nagging problem. Now the town must produce the leadership to solve the long-term one. It will require more than the rhetoric political seasons often bring.

a seat at the table. It must stop! Change their way of governing us, and make our tenure in office long enough to judge your work. Not what you put in the paper, but what you try to accomplish in four years. Then we can come to judge whether you were living or just another dead-head in office. Make your work worthy of our vote.

Third, and last, is the hunting issue. I read "we won hunting rights" in our traditional lands to the north. From the way our chairman talked, they were from another country; they were Okanagans that lived by a lake, whom you called Lake Indians. If you have "won" hunting there, it is only right that you allow the brothers and sisters that are

Okanagans to hunt and fish in our land, because it was once all our land of the Syilx People. You must stop this infernal idea that we are from another world. We are one People; we should have equal rights in our land; we are the same.

Try to learn your history. Some of the "bands" that are here now were only here since 1885, a hundred and thirty-odd years ago. The Syilx People have been here since the beginning, many thousands of years.

This old truck



Guinness caught in Brexit border cross-fire

When the Economist Magazine reported the price of a Guinness pint could increase because of Brexit, it grabbed readers' attention.

Brexit is the process whereby Great Britain, including Northern Ireland and Scotland, is withdrawing from the European Union. The Republic of Ireland remains with 26 other nations.

EU members benefit from a standardized system of laws which allows the free movement of people and goods. Costly border checkpoints were abolished, but because of Brexit, they may be reconstructed between Ireland and Northern Ireland.

While Guinness is brewed at the historic St. James' Gate plant in downtown Dublin, it is transported north by tanker trucks to Belfast for bottling and canning. Then it is returned to Dublin for export. Guinness ships 13,000 tankers across that border each year.

Guinness has been brewed in Dublin since 1759. Its dark stout is one of the most successful beers worldwide. In today's highly competitive beverage market, price and timely deliveries matter.

Bailey's Irish Cream, a sister company owned by Diageo, receives much of its milk from the north. Its combined ingredients travel across country lines three times before it is bottled and shipped overseas.

The old border checkpoints with watch towers, armed guards and coils of razor-sharp concertina wire are gone. Today, the most noticeable way drivers can tell when they are entering Northern Ireland is the road signs change from kilometers to miles.

Writers for The Economist said it best: "The melting away of the militarized frontier into a mere line on a map was perhaps the most visible achievement of the Good Friday Agreement, the 1998 accord that largely brought an end to three decades of violence."

The agreement not only brought an end to sectarian warfare, but also brought prosperity. However, the Republic of Ireland economy is already hurting because of Brexit. The Economist reports that Brexit caused a 3.5-percent drop in Irish GDP.

Big firms, such as Guinness, may cope with the extra costs, but it is likely to impact smaller businesses with low margins, the Economist reports. For example, Ireland's farmers and food processors have been hit hard by the drop in the value of the pound sterling since the Brexit vote last year.

In today's fast paced world, time is money. Guinness estimates that even a short delay of 30 minutes to an hour for customs checks would cost \$1.45 million (€1.3m) a year. While many British and Irish leaders are scrambling to avoid re-establishing border crossings, the collision between Brexit and EU laws and regulations seem to make them inevitable.

Nearly a decade ago, I wrote a column about what happens when cross-border supply chains are threatened.

At the time, President Obama's "Buy America" initiative was aimed at making sure that our government procurements, such as water treatment plants, contained only parts made in the United States. Canadian leaders threatened retaliation.

The Campbell Soup Company that I cited as an example is still germane today.

According to Doug Conant, then CEO of Campbell Soup Company, 4,000 shipments of ingredients for its food products cross from our country into Canada each day and 3,500 come from Canada into the U.S. Some of the vegetables cross the border twice when ingredients from processing plants in both countries are mixed, packaged and distributed to retailers across the globe.

While "Buy America" was well intended, it backfired and the President soon learned that unbundling that supply chain would have a catastrophic impact. That applies to Brexit as well.

Ireland and Northern Ireland benefit from open borders. If they must restore borders and checkpoints, hopefully they will find ways to expedite crossings and limit economic consequences.



Derlyn William Brown

Derlyn William Brown, 74, well-known resident of Grand Coulee, Washington, retired firefighter and tireless volunteer to his community, passed away unexpectedly at his home Thursday morning, July 13, 2017. Derlyn was born August 29, 1942, in Clearfield, Utah, to Alma M. and NaOla Brown. The family moved to Washington in 1956. Derlyn graduated from Moses Lake High School in 1960. He was called to serve in the Southwest Indian Mission, laboring among the Navajo people (1962-1964). In the fall of 1964, Derlyn reported to Lackland Air Force Base, Texas, beginning a 30-year career with the Air National Guard. He met the love of his life, Sheila Kay Barney, on June 10, 1964, and one year and one day later, June 11, 1965, they were married for time and all eternity in the Logan Utah temple. In 1971, they moved to Spokane, where Derlyn continued his career as a firefighter at Geiger Field. In 1977, they moved to Grand Coulee for "1-3 years," taking a firefighting position with the USBR, from which he retired in 1994. He also retired from the Grand Coulee Volunteer Fire Department in 2007. Following his USBR retirement, he worked for People for People and GTA. At his passing, he was a volunteer driver for Catholic Charities and SMS. As a life-long active member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, he served in many capacities, including bishop of the Coulee Dam Ward for 6 years. In March 2014, Derlyn and Sheila received a call to serve an 18-month senior mission at historic Cove Fort, Utah. Derlyn's personal priorities were always clear: 1 – the Gospel of



Jesus Christ, 2 – his sweetheart, Sheila, and 3 – his children and grandchildren. He loved spending time with his family camping, snowmobiling, fishing and waterskiing, going on long rides with Sheila on his candy-apple-red Honda Gold Wing, playing golf and, most recently, turning wood/making pens. Derlyn was "the" eternal cheerful optimist, who loved life and loved people.
