Fire updates

The Cayuse Mountain fire near Wellpinit on the Spokane Indian reservation was reported as 85 percent contained Tuesday. The fire had destroyed 14 houses and nine other structures, and had burned over 18,714 acres. The fire started Aug. 21, and 422 fire personnel have been assigned to the blaze that started when the Hart Fire jumped the Spokane River arm of Lake Roosevelt. That fire burned nearly 5,000 acres, 14 residences and 25 outbuildings. The Porcupine Bay Campground, day-use area, and boat launch reopened Monday morning, the National Park Service said.

Household hazardous waste day coming

Grand Coulee Dam area residents may dispose of household hazardous waste for free, Friday, Sept. 9, from noon to 4 pm. at the Delano Regional Transfer Station. Only hazardous waste generated by households will be accepted.

Town not interested in USBR bid

Coulee Dam will not offer a bid to provide police services to the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation at Grand Coulee Dam. Mayor Greg Wilder said requirements of the latest call for bids would cause the town to lose money, a far cry from the earliest contracts that saw local police departments provided with equipment and cars, plus money for more officers.

Wilder had asked the town council a month ago if anyone thought the contract should be pursued. He said at last Wednesday's council meeting that no one on the council seemed any more interested than he was.

Lake going down

The Bureau of Reclamation has started its annual fall drawdown of Lake Roosevelt to help fish migration downstream and boaters should be aware of the lowering lake, the agency warned on its Facebook page.

"If you are planning to go out on the Lake this weekend please be aware of the elevation of your desired boat launch," their post says, noting that some boat launches are already dry and others that are shallow could be dry after a day on the lake, leaving boaters with no way to trailer their boats.

Pair taking over managing fish-raising project

The fish pens in Electric City have a new manager, in fact a pair of them.

Carl Russell, who has managed the fish pens for the past 25 years and is retiring, said last week that Greg Anderson and Bob Meeker have agreed to co-manage the popular fish net pen operation that raises hundreds of thousands of fish each year, supporting the local sport-fishing economy.

Both have been involved in P.O.W.E.R. (Promoters of Wildlife and Environmental Resources) for some time, especially in the feeding program.

Russell, at 79, said earlier this year that it was time to step down. The organization has had some trouble getting someone to step up and take charge of the fish pen program.

The two will cooperate in leading the volunteers needed to keep the fish-feeding program viable.

Anderson, a former appraiser for Ferry County,

Meeker has lived in the area for 14 years and uses this as his base for troubleshooting for major companies that have problems. "I am a fix-it person," he laughed.

Both Anderson and Meeker have put out a call for volunteers.

Russell added his voice to the need for volunteers. "The program is run with volunteers, and we need some people to share some time with us," Russell stated.

The two new managers stepped forward just in

The fish nets expect about 150,000 new rainbow trout fingerlings in mid-October. These fish will be released into Banks Lake sometime in March.

Coulee Dam votes to file suit against Elmer City

Coulee Dam instructed the town's attorney last week to file a lawsuit against Elmer City for breach of a decades-old contract between the two towns, saying Elmer City isn't paying its bills.

Following an executive session of the town council Wednesday night, the council voted unanimously to sue. Mayor Greg Wilder said Elmer City was in arrears at least \$55,000 in charges Coulee Dam has billed for processing the smaller town's sewage, more if certain capitalized costs are included.

"They've overcharged us for labor for years," Elmer City Mayor Gail Morin said Thursday morning, adding that Coulee Dam has also been trying to bill for those capital costs, which she said aren't allowed by the contract.

"For the past 38 years, we were subsidizing Coulee Dam's wage distribution a little at a time," Morin contended.

She said Elmer City had received a \$64,000 bill last month that included charges for a new pickup, past engineering studies on Elmer City's "smelly sewage," and for land Coulee Dam bought nearby in preparation to build a new wastewater treatment plant. Elmer City decided to pay just sewer treatment operating costs, about \$9,300, she said.

Morin claimed Coulee Dam has billed based on operating costs that include 100 percent of the plant operator's time, but she said he doesn't spend all his time at the plant.

She said Elmer City had never been billed for capital costs before Wilder took over as mayor.

Concerns on crime stated

A fairly upbeat report on crime statistics in Coulee Dam didn't assuage fears among residents who expressed dire concerns at the town council meeting about increasing petty crime.

Mayor Greg Wilder recited findings from USA.com, a site that compiles all kinds of statistics, but invoked the Mark Twain quote that there are "lies, damned lies and statistics."

That site noted last year that the town had the second-best record in the state. But Wilder said he'd also compiled stats from state sources on nearby towns and that Coulee Dam still looked very good by comparison.

Nevertheless, citizens said, things have taken a turn for the

Larry Price, who lives on Tilmus Street, said his neighborhood has seen "a lot of wanderers" who look over property and seem to assess open garages and more.

"We're going to have to do something to protect our citizens," said another speaker, who asked not to be identified because she feared retaliation. "It's out of hand. ... It's not just Coulee Dam's problem; it's the whole entire community's problem."

"It's a serious issue," Wilder

said. Interim Police Chief Larry Hall said some of the people caus-

Grand Coulee to seek lighting grant

Grand Coulee is going to move forward and seek a grant to install LED street lights throughout the city, Mayor Paul Townsend said last week.

The issue was brought up by public works Director Dennis Francis at the August 16 city council meeting.

Francis told the council that the city regularly spends about \$2,708 a month (\$33,355 a year) on power to illuminate its many street lights. He estimated that

the city could save about 30-40 LED lighting. Right now the PUD percent of what it now spends by installing LED (light emitting diode) lights. Francis said Friday that the savings could be as high as 50 percent.

Townsend said the city has a lot of things going on, but with a potential savings like that he would like to get it done as quickly as a grant would allow.

Francis said he is working on applying for a Transportation Improvement Board "Relight Washington" LED grant. "I have to wait

doesn't have a rate category for LEDs," Francis said.

The town of Coulee Dam installed LED street lights through a pilot grant. In 2012, the last full year before installing the new lights, the town had spent \$10,646.69 for street lighting

Town Clerk Stefani Bowden said Coulee Dam reduced its 63 percent, and the cost continues to come down.

In Coulee Dam, street lighting

In addition to the power savings, LED lights take less maintenance and the bulbs last longer.

Anderson, who fishes Banks

Local fisherman Greg Anderson caught what must be a nearrecord catfish in Banks Lake recently.

Anderson, from Coulee Dam, said he was fishing near the buoys at North Dam, when a 34.7-pound catfish struck his crappie jig.

"It was about 45 minutes before I got my first look at it," Anderson said.

Two other anglers in the boat helped him finally net the big fish.

"It filled the net," Anderson stated. "I was really tired bringing the fish in. The head of the catfish was bigger than a football and was nearly half of its size."

A number of pictures of the fish are on display at Coulee Playland.

One reason the catch was so difficult to land is that Anderson was using a light pole with an 8-pound-test line.

Catfish had been introduced nto the lake about 12 years ago, and Anderson's is equal to the largest caught, according to Cou-

lee Playland's Lou Nevsimal. Nevsimal said he recalls a 20-pounder and a 34-pounder caught in the lake in the last few

Colville Tribes awarded \$8.3 million from Teck for legal costs

The US District Court for the District of Eastern Washington has ruled that Teck Metals Ltd. must pay nearly \$8.3 million to the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation for all past costs related to the Tribes' ongoing legal battle to force the Canadian smelter company to clean up mine waste pollutants it sent across the border for decades, the Tribes announced in a press re-

The Aug. 12 ruling by the Judge Lonny Suko is the most recent victory by the Tribes who, along with the state of Washington, successfully sued Teck to force the company to comply with the U.S. Superfund law.

The \$8.3 million will cover the environmental investigation and legal response costs (attorney's fees, expert witnesses, etc.) incurred since the legal fight began, and means Teck will also have to pay costs going forward. The total costs of the cleanup and the restoration of damaged natural resources have not been determined, but the Colvilles hope the ruling will mean actual cleanup can proceed more quickly.

For nearly a century, Teck's smelter released slag and liquid effluent, a toxic byproduct of metals refining, directly into the Columbia River, and pumped toxins

into the air that polluted Tribal and Washington state lands. More than 10 million tons of the granular slag created the "black sand" beaches of the Upper Columbia, a 150-mile reach of the river between the Canadian border and Grand Coulee Dam.

The river is the natural resource and cultural lifeblood of the Colville Tribes and must be protected and restored, the Tribes said.

Regulatory and legal processes will continue to guide the cleanup, but there can be no more delay in action, the Tribes said, noting that several efforts to reintroduce migrating fish in the Upper Columbia are moving forward.

"It is critical that the sediments in the Upper Columbia be cleaned up to ensure returning fish have the chance to thrive in a healthy river environment," the tribal press release stated. "Only cleanup will create that opportunity."

Roll on, Columbia River **Treaty negotiations**

ington knows the Columbia River is the defining natural feature of our region. As the largest river in the Western Hemisphere that flows into the Pacific Ocean, it has long guided the way of life for people living in the Pacific Northwest. From water storage and transportation to recreation, flood control,

energy production, and wildlife habitat, our management of the Columbia River will continue to determine the economic future of our region.

We share this magnificent resource with our neighbor to the north, which is why updating the treaty between the U.S. and Canada to govern the Columbia should be a top priority for the federal government. Unfortunately, instead of expediting this important

matter, this administration has been dragging its feet on the necessary review process for commencing Columbia River Treaty (CRT) negotiations.

The CRT was implemented in 1964 to manage electricity generation and flood control, and it has not been updated since then, despite significant developments in the intervening five decades. One example of the many major provisions that require modernization is the "Canadian Entitlement." The original treaty now requires U.S. ratepayers in the Pacific Northwest to provide an entitlement of \$250 million to \$350 million for hydroelectric power to Canada. The purpose of the entitlement was to compensate Canada for flood control and storage mea-

Anyone who has spent time in Central Wash- sures, though it is based on severely outdated treaty assumptions. The Canadian Entitlement needs to be revisited and rebalanced in a way that is fair for ratepayers and electricity consumers in the U.S.

Renegotiating the CRT is important for the Northwest, but why the rush? The bipartisan, bicameral congressional effort to nudge the admin-

> istration into action began in 2014 because that is when the clock started ticking on the life of this treaty. On Sep. 16, 2024, with 10 years notice, either Canada or the U.S. can terminate most of the treaty's provisions. We are already well into the 10-year timeframe when proposed modifications must be legally noticed. Since I have been in Congress, I have joined my congressional colleagues in

Washington, Oregon, Idaho, and Montana on numerous occasions to urge the administration and the lead agency for negotiations, the U.S. Department of State, to complete the necessary review process and begin treaty negotiations immediately. While a new lead U.S. negotiator was finally appointed last fall, there has still been very little progress.

Time is running out to modernize the outdated treaty that governs the 1,200-mile-long Columbia and impacts millions of Americans in the Pacific Northwest. There is much at stake, and this is a complex matter, but I will continue to apply pressure on this administration to make modernization a priority this year.





Childfind Screening Applications Available At School District Office

Birth to age five preschool children not currently enrolled in the Grand Coulee Dam School District may be eligible for a free developmental screening. Interested parents should request forms for a developmental screening and health inventory from the School District Office. It is especially important for a parent to complete the forms if they think their child may be developmentally delayed, i.e. be in need of occupational/physical or speech therapy, or other possible health problems that may impede a child from being ready for learning. Completed forms need to be returned to the District Office.

Completed forms submitted by parents/guardians will be reviewed and a determination will be made as to whether the child needs to be scheduled for additional Childfind Screening and/or assessments.

Parents/guardians will be notified of results of the developmental screening as soon as possible. Parents/guardians of children considered in need of additional services will be notified to schedule further assessments.

To request developmental screenings and health inventory forms please call Debbie Van Geystel at 633-2143 Monday-Thursday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) (20 U.S.C. § 1232g; 34 CFR Part 99) is a Federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. The law applies to all schools that receive funds under an applicable program of the U.S. Department of Education.

FERPA gives parents certain rights with respect to their children's education records. These rights transfer to the student when he or she reaches the age of 18 or attends a school beyond the high school level. Students to whom the rights have transferred are "eligible students."

*Parents or eligible students have the right to inspect and review the student's education records maintained by the school. Schools are not required to provide copies of records unless, for reasons such as great distance, it is impossible for parents or eligible students to review the records. Schools may charge a fee for copies.

*Parents or eligible students have the right to request that a school correct records, which they believe to be inaccurate or misleading. If the school decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student then has the right to a formal hearing. After the hearing, if the school still decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student has the right to place a statement with the record setting forth his or her view about the contested information.

*Generally, schools must have written permission from the parent or eligible student in order to release any information from a student's education record. However, FERPA allows schools to disclose those records, without consent, to the following parties or under the following conditions (34 CFR § 99.31):

- * School officials with legitimate educational interest;
- * Other schools to which a student is transferring;
- Specified officials for audit or evaluation purposes;
 Appropriate parties in connection with financial aid.
- * Appropriate parties in connection with financial aid to a student;
- * Organizations conducting certain studies for or on behalf of the school;
- * Accrediting organizations;
- To comply with a judicial order or lawfully issued subpoena;
- * Appropriate officials in cases of health and safety emergencies;
- * State and local authorities, within a juvenile justice system, pursuant to specific State law.

Schools may disclose, without consent, "directory" information such as a student's name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, honors and awards, and dates of attendance. However, schools must tell parents and eligible students about directory information and allow parents and eligible students a reasonable amount of time to request that the school not disclose directory information about them. Schools must notify parents and eligible students annually of their rights under FERPA.

The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the District to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA is:






