Electric City to display park plan Thursday afternoon

Local residents will have an opportunity to see and comment on Electric City's park and recreation plan Thursday, June 8, at 3 p.m. at city hall.

The park plan has yet to come before the city council, and there will be plenty of time for public comment before it becomes chiseled in stone, City Clerk Russell Powers stated. In addition to this

public presentation, the city is planning a public hearing on the plan sometime in July.

The plan was developed by a team of an assistant professor and students at Washington State University after several information-gathering public meetings in Electric City.

The plan was just returned from one of the city's prospective grant sources without any suggestion of changes.

At the top of the chart is the development of two parks in the city, one near the arsenic treatment plant and the other behind the fire department building.

The goal, according to city officials, is to apply for grants in 2018 and develop the parks in 2019.

That development all depends on grants.

The overall plan includes such things as sidewalks in the downtown area, an

Ice Age Floods trail system, and other cosmetic improvements.

The trail system has become a sore spot for some residents who don't want trails in their neighborhood.

The city sometime ago set aside \$400,000 from its hotel/motel tax fund as matching money for the trail section between Coulee Playland and North Dam Park. That notion would have to be tweaked so the city could target its use

on a broader plan.

The public will see the finished plan, and make comments on it, before it goes to the public hearing stage and then to the city council.

At any rate, the draft plan is finished, is available for tweaking, and the process will go on.

Firm proposed to design city parks

The city council at Electric City will have the opportunity next Tuesday, June 13, to select the design firm for its two proposed city parks.

The community parks committee has recommended that a Lacey firm, Robert Droll, Landscape Architect, be selected to take the city through the design and engineering phase of the future project.

City Clerk Russell Powers said last week that the city had received five proposals from its advertisement seeking either a landscape architect, or an engineering firm to do the advance work for the two Ice Age Floods-themed city parks — one at McNett and Western (behind the fire station) and the other at Grand Avenue and Kent (near the arsenic treatment plant).

Powers said the council will review the Lacey firm's proposal, and if that is rejected, then will be

Big load makes its destination to switchyard

A 20-foot-wide, 346-foot-long load weighing about a million pounds made it to its destination after a two-day trip from Coulee City to the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation's 230-kilovolt Switchyard early Thursday morning.

The big rig carrying an electrical transformer had to be driven in the middle of the night in order to block as little traffic as possible and stopped at a pullout along SR-155 across from Steamboat Rock on Wednesday.

The sight and a post on the state Department of Transportation Facebook page inspired discussion among enthusiasts about arcane details such as the exact weight carried by each of the tires on the rig's 32 axles and what the color of the engine on the lead tractor meant. Two semi tractors were also attached at the rear to push.

Workers are still installing the new unit that is replacing one that ruptured March 23 just north of Grand Coulee. The old transformer, manufactured in 1971, performed as designed when a relay system shut the transformer down as it ruptured,

said USBR Public Affairs Officer Lynne Brougner.

The new transformer came from Vancouver, Washington, and cost \$3 million, plus another \$3 million just to move the unit and install it at its new home. It was shipped by rail from Vancouver to a siding outside Coulee City, where it waited for an extra week as details were worked out on weight distribution.

The "emergency" move took about a month to plan, according to an official with Omega Morgan, a Hillsboro, Oregon, company. It finally arrived Thursday morning

after moving about 10 miles an hour starting about 1 a.m.

"The move was completed this morning," Omega Morgan Project Manager Mark Richardson announced simply in an email at 5:13 a.m.

Brougner said the unit failure in March did not affect the larger electrical grid and was contained at the switchyard, a result that might have been different had it happened during a time of heavier load on the system, such as a hot summer day.

Coulee City man dies in crash

A Coulee City man died early Friday morning just north of Soap Lake.

Michael S. Burns, 62, was driving south on SR-17 in a red 2001 GMC Yukon when it crossed the northbound lanes about 4:50 a.m. onto a gravel shoulder, veered back across the southbound lanes, then left the road to the right at milepost 76.

The Yukon went over an embankment, rolled and came to rest on the driver's side, according to the Washington State Patrol, which is investigating the cause of the crash.

Big fireworks planned for July 1

The fireworks over Grand Coulee Dam will occur this year on Saturday, July 1, officials said last week.

The traditional Festival of America, the July 4 celebration, will be June 30 – July 1 this year, according to the Grand Coulee Dam Area Chamber of Commerce, sponsor of the event.

"Our board labored over this for a long time and reasoned that because July 4 split the work week, members thought this was the best solution," chamber Executive Director Peggy Nevsimal stated.

The Independence Day holiday falls on Tuesday this year, presenting a problem for the group putting on the festival, which even in ideal years can lose money but is intended to bring in tourists and fill motels and campgrounds.

Other than donations, the only income the event generates for the chamber comes from vendors who pay for space in the park below the dam and any other activities that can be organized, such

as a beer tent.

"We called around and almost everyone is having their celebrations like we are doing," Nevsimal said, describing the plans other communities have made.

Already, the chamber has over 30 vendor booths scheduled for the annual festival.

Fireworks are being handled

by Rocketman Pyro, out of Spokane, their second time putting on the show.

The fireworks show, costing about \$10,000, is financed through hotel/motel tax funds, and corporate donations.

Last year's fireworks show lasted just over 35 minutes and is expected to be about the same

this year.

It typically follows the Laser Light Show, which begins at 9:30.

"We have advertised the fireworks date change in our bigger markets and have tried to let people know," Nevsimal said. "And the word is out on the change at the Visitor Center," Nevsimal added.

able to make a selection from one of the other firms.

Powers said the Lacey firm had already selected Gray & Osborne as its engineering firm to do the engineering aspect of the parks' work.

The firms submitting proposals in addition to Droll were Bruce Dees & Associates; Michael Terrell, Landscape Architect; Bernard/Willis, Architects; and SPVV Landscape Architects.

The community advisory group making the selection and recommendation to the council includes Brad Parrish, Clark Perman, Lynda Anderson, Jeff Piturachsatit, Cindy Greely, Lonna Bussert, Bergan Palma and Aaron Derr.

In the advertisement for proposals, the project was summarized as follows: The construction of two Ice Age Floods parks, including crosswalks, sidewalks,

trees, potted plants, public restrooms, shade structures, retaining walls, playground equipment, a water splash pad, basketball court, climbing wall, barbecue pit, irrigation system, fencing and general landscape features.

The anticipated starting date for construction of the two parks is 2019, Powers stated.

The city hopes to submit a grant request to the Recreation Conservation Office (RCO) in 2018, for possible project funding.

The firms submitting proposals were asked to develop primary design, detailed design and the preparation of grant materials.

The Ice Age Flood two-park proposal is part of the city's Park and Recreation plan that extends throughout the city and includes trails, sidewalks and other features.

School may seek parking from National Park Service

The Grand Coulee Dam School District is looking for additional parking for its staff.

Superintendent Paul Turner told his board that discussions are underway with the National Park Service to use the lower end of the NPS complex for school parking.

Turner said last Friday that, on occasion, parking around the new school complex is in short supply.

"If we are eventually able to utilize some space across the street from the school for parking, it would be very helpful," Turner stated.

It is uncertain what kind of arrangement could be made with the NPS on the parking issue, but "we would have to do some things to make the space usable for parking," Turner added.

The space under consideration is at the foot of the big sandpile in Coulee Dam.

Can trees migrate?

Really, do trees migrate? The answer is a yes. A little clarification here, though; trees don't actually move themselves. What does occur: tree populations can shift over time. A recent study confirms that, over the past three decades, trees in the eastern United States are shifting their population centers west and north. Several tree species common in the east, such as white oak, sugar maples, and American hollies, have shifted their population center west since 1980. The study also shows that more than half of the species studied also moved populations centers northward during the same time period.

So, what the heck is going on? you may ask. The science team has a hypothesis: Climate change has increased temperatures across the eastern United States; it has also altered rainfall totals. The Northeast has received a bit more rain since 1980 than it did during the past century. Meanwhile, the Southeast has gotten a bit less rain. Meanwhile, the Great Plains, with emphasis on Oklahoma and Kansas, get much more rain than historically normal.

"Different species are responding to climate change differently. Most of the broad leaf species — deciduous trees — are following moisture moving westward. The evergreen trees — the needle trees — are primarily moving northward," according to one author of the study from Purdue University.

There are potentially many forces and factors at work, as well — from land use changes, wildfire frequency and various types of pests and blights. Still, the scientists argue that at least 20 percent of the change in population area is driven by changes in

precipitation caused by climate change. If you would like to read the study, it's available on the web at science.advancesmag.org and entitled "Divergence of species responses to climate change."

Well, how has our local weather (not climate) been this past month of May? It appears that we are starting to see "normal" precipitation patterns again. Here at the home weather station we got 1.71 inches of rainfall, or 0.61 inches above the mean rainfall, for May at 1.10 inches. Should note that so far this calendar year we've received 9.52 inches of precipitation here at my home weather station. Again, we average 10.55 inches annually. An above-average year for precipitation is fast approaching. We had a high temperature of 90.7°F (all-time high was 100°F in 1986) on the 29th and a low of 34.0°F (all-time low of 21°F in 2002) on the 14th. The Climate Prediction Center

says for the next three months there is a 30-percent chance of above-normal temperatures, while precipitation has an equal chance of being above or below normal.

Looking skyward during the month of June, our friends at EarthSky share this with us: "Three of the five bright planets are easy to see in June 2017: Jupiter, Saturn and Venus. Jupiter appears first thing at dusk and stays out until well after midnight. Saturn rises at dusk or nightfall and stays out for the rest of the night. Venus rises before the sun and reaches its greatest elongation — its farthest point from the sun on our sky's dome — on June 3rd. Mars and Mercury will be hard to spot this month."

WENATCHEE VALLEY ERRATICS CHAPTER OF THE ICE AGE FLOODS INSTITUTE TO MEET

Wenatchee Valley Erratics Chapter of the Ice Age Floods Institute will meet at 7:00 p.m., Tuesday, June 13, at the Wenatchee Valley Museum, 127 South Mission, Wenatchee. "Spokane Valley's 16,000 year old Glacial Lake Missoula outburst flood" 16,000 years ago a single megaflood deposit filled the upper reaches of glacial Lake Columbia to a depth of 1300 feet, extending from Rathdrum Prairie southwest to Fort Spokane. As glacial Lake Columbia filled with flood sediments, rising water levels breached the southern shoreline of glacial Lake Columbia, surging into the Channeled Scabland tracts. What is the implication of this megaflood in relation to subsequent Missoula floods that occurred between 16,000 and 13,000 years ago? Are numerous flood deposits located near the confluence of the Spokane and Columbia rivers the result of flooding from under the Columbia ice sheet lobe? Our speaker, retired geologist Mike McCollum, will discuss these radical ideas, developed with his EWU geologist wife, Linda. The program is free and open to the public. 
