New super hired for Nespalem

Rich Stewart will take the helm of the Nespalem School District in July. Stewart has served as the interim superintendent at the Chimacum School District for the last two years, and was hired by a vote of the Nespalem district board Monday night. The position is part time for a total of 867 hours per year, about two days a week. His salary will be \$40,000.

LaPlace takes school board seat

The school board Monday night selected George LaPlace to fill the at large position vacated by Ted Piccolo. LaPlace, an operator at Grand Coulee Dam, will be sworn in during the July meeting. One open position on the school board remains.

Still no pot allowed

Electric City has extended its moratorium prohibiting marijuana production, processing, and retail sales and/or medical marijuana production, processing, cultivation, storage, sale, delivery, exchange or bartering including collective gardens and dispensaries in all zoning districts within the city for another six months while zoning issues in the city are determined.

School district invites public to budget meeting

The Grand Coulee Dam School District has changed its meeting date from June 22 to June 29 at 5:30 p.m. The meeting will be held at the Lake Roosevelt Jr/Sr library at the new school. The public is invited. At the meeting the school board will receive the 2015-16 school budget. The public will be given an opportunity to speak concerning the budget.

Piano recital slated

The public is invited to a senior piano recital by Emily Rice, Saturday, June 20, at 1 p.m., at the United Methodist Church in Grand Coulee. A reception will follow.

Second prize is \$120 and third prize is \$80. The contest raises money for the golf course's weed spray program.

Man's body found in lake

A Mansfield man was found deceased in the water in Banks Lake near Barker Canyon Thursday.

A Bothell woman, Cheryl Montgomery, found Michael R. Nachtigal, 63, and notified the sheriff's office in Grant County about 3:30 p.m.

Grand Coulee officer Chris McClanahan assisted in the recovery of the body until county officers arrived on the scene.

Sheriff Tom Jones stated that investigators found no evidence of foul play.

Nachtigal worked as a general construction laborer and framer and on several ranches and farms in the area.

He also spent a short time working for Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife planting wildlife habitat in Douglas County.

Eric Braaten, who works for that agency described Nachtigal

as "one of the hardest working men I have known."

"He was always there when you needed help and he was a genuine friend," recalled Braaten. "He lived life on his terms and the way he wanted. ... He loved his animals and he always put others' needs before his own."

Coulee Dam police to serve Electric City

Electric City citizens will be served by a police department an extra city away next year.

Coulee Dam got the contract for 2016 to provide police services to Electric City, whose city council, with little discussion, agreed June 9 to a five-year contract with Coulee Dam's police department at \$122,223.42 a year.

For decades, Electric City has contracted with Grand Coulee for police services. But that will all end Dec. 31, of this year.

Currently, Electric City pays Grand Coulee \$115,000 a year for police services.

Council committees from both Grand Coulee and Electric City

have been meeting to try to arrive at some kind of agreement for continuing services.

At Grand Coulee's last city council meeting, the council passed its proposal for an agreement, asking \$150,000 a year, and with the stipulation that Electric City agree to pay 25 percent of upgrades, unexpected expenditures and capital improvement costs.

That didn't set well with Electric City, and apparently anticipating this the city had asked Coulee Dam to submit a proposal.

This would mean that Coulee Dam will have to add a person to its police department and that Grand Coulee will likely cut its police staff by one officer.

Grand Coulee currently has

Golf event depends on an LRHS grad

Cpt. Scott Mielcarek is incident commander for U.S. Open

Security for the biggest event in golf in the United States is all up to a guy who graduated from Lake Roosevelt High School in 1983.

Scott Mielcarek is coordinating efforts with dozens of law enforcement agencies and hundreds of personnel for the U.S. Open, happening this week near Tacoma, at the Chambers Bay golf course on Puget Sound.

The USGA expects 235,000 spectators to attend the event.

Mielcarek, a captain with the Pierce County Sheriff's Department, is is charged with keeping


them as safe as possible.

"It's a Super Bowl day for seven days in a row that will be viewed by 150 million people." Mielcarek said Monday. That makes it a desirable venue for anybody who wants to make a very public statement about some cause.

"Unfortunately, in the world we live in today, you have to be prepared for people that may want to take some type of action," he said.

Mielcarek, who supervises the sheriff's department's criminal investigations division, has been basically focused on the U.S. Open for the last year. But he actually started preparing in 2009, when he was incident commander for the U.S. Amateur Open. Then he attended the last four U.S. Opens to learn from law enforcement at each of those events.

But Chambers Bay, where the USGA has constructed a tempo-

rary city in the last few weeks, has some unique challenges for security. A railroad track runs in front of it with several daily freight and Amtrak trains passing through. And the course is right on Puget Sound.

It's a county-owned course within the city of University Place, and parking and traffic will be affected in Puyallup, Tacoma, Stillacum and Lakewood.

Coordinating security involves including all those entities, including the railroad and the U.S. Coast Guard, which is patrolling the waters, allowing no boats closer than 1,000 yards.

Mielcarek said more than 36 police agencies are helping in the event, local, state and federal. And that doesn't include hundreds of private security staffers.

"This is a huge event," Mielcarek said. "There is no one agency that can handle this alone."

He wouldn't say exactly what the security personnel number is,

but it's in the hundreds, including staff on the course, working traffic, in uniform and out, boats in the water and dozens of explosives detection dogs.

Mielcarek, who was born and raised here (his mother is Susan Miller of Electric City), had had little more than a couple hours sleep Sunday night, and he's brought his personal trailer on site.

But it's exciting to see plans that have been coming together for years working well, so far, he said.

Tuesday and Wednesday, the pros were playing practice rounds. Tiger Woods, Jordan Spieth, Jimmy Walker ... they'll all be there. As will hords of fans, of modest means and huge wealth, none of whom are likely to think too much about security.

That's the job of Mielcarek and a whole lot of people working in the background.

"It's very rewarding to see it all come together," Mielcarek said.

eight officers, and Coulee Dam has four. The fourth officer was just recently hired and will be going to academy training as soon as he completes his university degree in June.

Coulee Dam Police Chief Pat Collins said Wednesday that he was surprised. He had worked out Coulee Dam's offer with Mayor Greg Wilder and Town Clerk Stefani Bowden.

Because Grand Coulee is between Coulee Dam and Electric City, Coulee Dam officers may have to respond to calls in a hurry coming through Grand Coulee.

Collins said his department's policy is that patrol cars are to use their emergency lights and not exceed the legal speed limit by more than 10 mph. He didn't think going through another department's jurisdiction would be a problem.

Grand Coulee Police Chief John Tufts commented on the change:

The fate of some Colville Business Council positions is fuzzy as a result of polling last Saturday. Absentee ballots will be counted this Thursday, providing the final vote tally.

Both races in Nespelem are close. In Position 1, Brian J. Nissen led Ricky Gabriel, 105-97; and in Position 2, Sheila Cleveland was ahead of longtime council member Andy Joseph Jr, 105-97.

In the two Omak council positions, the races are equally close.

In Omak Position 1, Karen Condon leads Richard Tonasket, 107-91, and Mel Tonasket leads Cherie Moomaw, 103-96 for Position 2.

In Inchelium District Position 1, Bessie Simpson led Stevey Seymour 98-68. In Inchelium Position 2, Elizabeth "Suzie" Allen led Allen Hammond, 99-70.

Absentee ballots will be counted by Thursday and the vote certified to determine who wins in the various races.

Bigger buildings allowed, if they fit

You can now have accessory buildings up to 3,000 square feet if you have property to support the size.

The Electric City Council accepted a number of changes to the building code at its meeting June 9, the most sought-after being the size of accessory buildings.

It has been in the works for about two years, and the changes to the planning commission's recommendations caused three of its four members to resign in protest.

The council adopted the International Building Code which allows accessory buildings up to 3,000 square feet in size.

But as one advocate suggested it would take a very big lot for

anyone to build a structure that large.

The council adopted language that requires accessory buildings have siding only "similar" to that of the residence.

The changes include fencing and home occupation business permits, not notable changes.

Mark Payne, who has worked with the planning commission and the city council has been frustrated with the length of time it has taken to finally get his request to put up an accessory building settled. He has been a spokesman to move the size of accessory buildings up from 850 square feet to the new change.

Documents showing the full zoning changes are available at city hall.

Fake money hits local area

There has been a wave of counterfeit money hitting the Grand Coulee area.

Police said Monday that they have picked up a number of 5's, 10's, 20's and a 50 so far from local businesses.

Some of the counterfeit copies are poorly done and are either poorly aligned, miss the watermarks and lines through the paper, or are done on paper obviously not matching regular paper money stock.

The police department in Grand Coulee asks that officers be informed when someone thinks they have a counterfeit bill.

Police Sgt. Gary Moore said that clerks should check the bills they receive carefully to avoid taking counterfeit bills.

He said that in most cases clerks are alert as to how to check a bill for authenticity and they should do so routinely.

"We want to know when you think you have a counterfeit bill in your till," Moore stated. "We ask that you refuse to take a bill that doesn't check out, and call us immediately."

A person at one firm told police that the "money didn't feel right." He said that when the person who passed the bill was confronted, she looked at the person she was with and said, "Let's get the hell

out of here."

In the case of the \$20 bill, it looked washed to the officer who viewed it. When he held it up to the light, he couldn't see the transparent heads of Thomas Jefferson.

"If it doesn't feel right, don't take it," Moore said.

Police are investigating the rash of counterfeit money.

Carol Nordine fills council post

Carol Nordine was selected to fill out Marie Chuinard's unexpired term on the Electric City council last Tuesday night, with a tie vote broken by the mayor, her son.

At the conclusion of the meeting she was sworn in by Mayor John Nordine.

She was one of two candidates who filed for Chuinard's vacated seat. The other was Birdie Hensley, who had served on the council earlier. Both will be on the November ballot for the full four-year term.

But the vote was close, end-

ing in a 2-2 tie, with the mayor breaking the tie. "No one agrees with their mother all the time," he commented. The city's attorney attended the session and didn't comment on that being a conflict of interest.

Chuinarnd resigned her seat about a month ago, citing health reasons, and commented by letter how much she had enjoyed serving on the council.

When Nordine's name came up for the vote, council members Richard McGuire and Lonna Bussert both voted no, while Aaron Derr and Brad Parrish voted yes. The mayor broke the tie.

Why run for office?

I spend a fair amount of time talking to students and other young people about Congress and politics in general, and I've noticed something. It used to be that I'd regularly get asked how one runs for office. Nowadays, I rarely do.

A lot of young people are repelled by politics; they've lost faith in the system just as many other Americans have. But look. If you don't have people who are willing to run for office, you don't have a representative democracy. As the leading edge of the Millennial generation reaches the age where running for office is a realistic possibility, I hope they'll consider a few things.

First, it's hard to find a more challenging job. The number, complexity, and diversity of the problems we face are astounding. As a politician, your work is never done; your to-do list is always full. It's intellectually as challenging an occupation as anything I can imagine.

Second, I don't know of another profession that puts you in touch with more people of more different types, ages, and views. You meet — and, if you're serious, really engage with — liberals and conservatives, voters rich and poor, religious believers and secular humanists alike. This is one of the great attractions of the job: the splendid array of individuals and convictions that you encounter in politics.

Finally, and perhaps most important, the work

can be immensely satisfying. Whatever level you're running at, whether it's for the school board or for President, you're doing it to try to make things work.


My first year in Congress, in 1965, I voted for Medicare. I'd had no role in drafting it. I played no substantive part in its passage. Yet I still remember that vote, and I still derive deep satisfaction from it. Because I know that I voted for legislation that has helped millions of people, and will continue to do so into the future. That's the thing about holding public office: you have a chance to contribute to the direction and success of a free society. In the scheme of things, this chance isn't given to all that many people.

There is no America without democracy, no democracy without politics, and no politics without elected politicians. There are a lot of exciting, challenging and satisfying professions out there, but here's what I tell young people: I consider politics chief among them.

Joey was born June 25, 1974, in Havre to Louis J. St. Marks and Lois Dolly Doney.


He lived in many cities over the years including Havre, Great

ATVs to be allowed on streets

You soon can run your wheeled ATVs on Electric City streets.

The city council passed an ordinance last week to allow all-terrain vehicles on city streets, and one permitting golf carts will soon follow.

The council, in passing the ATV ordinance, instructed city Clerk Jackie Perman to draw up a corresponding ordinance allowing golf carts the same privilege.

The ATV ordinance restricts speed to 35 miles per hour and to streets that don't have a higher speed limit. It also requires that the driver wear a helmet unless the ATV has a roll bar.

Other requirements include headlamps, tail light, brake light, windshield, a mirror, horn, a muffling device and seatbelts and a vehicle license.

Restrictions require that ATVs cross the state highway only at intersections. The ordinance has been discussed at council meetings for a number of months.


