Pair arrested after street light shot

Two men with guns were arrested and taken to Grant County jail after shooting a street light out from their car near the top of the Grand Coulee Dam.

The incident was reported to police by Plant Protection dispatcher Monroe Merriman, who heard the firing while outside his office.

Police stopped the pair near Greene Field, and they admitted firing and hitting the street light, police reported.

The two, Kristopher T. Simms, 24, from Port Townsend, Washington, and Paul J. Van Dyke, 23, from Chimacum, Washington, said they were on their way to Republic to go hunting.

The two are being charged with drive-by shooting, and malicious mischief.

When stopped, the pair told police that they had weapons inside the vehicle.

The two had several weapons in the vehicle when they were stopped. The weapons were taken by police officer Thomas Johnson for safekeeping.

Officer Johnson stated that the direction from which the two were firing was directly in line with the Grand Coulee Dam Security office.

The report stated that there might be as much as \$1,000 damage to the light fixture.

The light was shot out by a .22 caliber pistol. When Officer Johnson secured the pistol it was fully loaded.

County computers throw wrench in cities' work

Grant County computer systems being down last week will delay or make it more difficult for Electric City and Grand Coulee to develop budgets for 2017.

Electric City has a budget workshop scheduled for 6 p.m., Oct. 25.

"We will just have to work around this," City Clerk Jackie Perman said.

The county government's computer systems were completely offline for about two and a half hours Oct. 12, also making all but a few emergency phone numbers inoperable. Enhanced 9-1-1 was not affected. Jury duty was also canceled for the day. Partial service was restored by 3:30 p.m., but not all electronic files were available even then, and the work to restore the system was expected to take days.

In an email from the Grant County Assessor's Office sent to towns and cities, Chief Deputy Assessor Bobbee Poplawski noted: "I want to inform you that we will

be much later than anticipated at getting you your numbers for your budget and levies this year. We have had quite a few setbacks (computer software issues and this latest network issue)."

Perman said the council will be able to work on other budget issues at its workshop.

In Grand Coulee, City Clerk Carol Boyce and her council were set to deal with budget issues last night (Tuesday) at the city's regular monthly meeting. "We will have to see how the council wants to handle this delay," Boyce said Tuesday.

"Due to our not giving you your numbers, it is highly unlikely that you will be able to submit your budgets, certifications and resolutions to us by Nov. 30," Poplawski wrote. She added, "I ask that you please be patient with us during this time."

Coulee Dam Town Clerk Stefani Bowden said that she didn't think it would be a serious issue there, where a small corner of the town lies within Grant County.

Newsbriefs

City supports health district

Electric City Council voted \$2,000 last week, to renew its relationship with the Grant County Health District. The health district asks \$2 for each resident, and makes a number of special services available to cities and towns. The agreement is for 2017.

Free movie night

The Grand Coulee Dam PTA will offer a free movie, "Annie," at the Lake Roosevelt Elementary School cafeteria on Friday evening, Oct. 21. The doors will be open for the movie at 5:15. Those coming are asked to bring a pillow or blanket to lie on, or lawn chairs. Concessions will be for sale.

PTA plans festival

The PTA is scheduling its Fall Festival for Wednesday, Oct. 26, at the elementary school cafeteria. There will be carnival games, face painting and a costume contest. Food will be available. Tickets are 50 cents.

Plan on road delays

Work on SR-155 to Coulee City will continue weekdays from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., and drivers should expect up to 20-minute delays, the state Department of Transportation says.

Central Washington Asphalt is putting "rumble strips" down the center line in an \$848,000 project that started Sept. 19 and should be completed this month.

City adds extra money for WSU planning help

Electric City has agreed to provide Washington State University an additional \$1,000 to finish up work on its Pathway and Revitalization project.

The city had contracted with WSU's Rural Communities Design Initiative team last spring to do initial planning for a project that includes downtown sidewalks, two parks and a trail system along Banks Lake.

WSU Assistant Professor Kathleen Ryan, leader of the group, informed the city that her

group would need another \$1,000 to complete the project. The WSU RCDI group's original contract was for \$5,000.

The motion to provide another \$1,000 passed unanimously by the council at its last meeting.

Deputy City Clerk Russell Powers said that the team was going to break down the various elements of the plan with overlays so the city could eventually apply for grants to fund various parts of the overall plan.

The city plans to meet soon with National Park Service Ice Age Flood officials to move for-

ward on any interpretive message along the trail network and also in the city park projects. The NPS Rivers and Trails emphasis will become part of the city's plan.

In another development, the city has learned that the overall project will be a separate document that will become part of the city's Comprehensive Plan.

It earlier was thought that the city would have to revise its Comprehensive Plan, a lengthy process. Now it is apparent that the city's Pathway and Revitalization plan will be a standalone document.

Man rescued on lake thought he was "a goner"

A 69-year-old man spent over 10 hours shivering in Banks Lake after his boat capsized Saturday afternoon, Oct. 1.

Donald L. Childers, of Brewster, had been fishing on Banks Lake for about an hour when wind-swept waves capsized his 13-foot fishing boat about 2:30 in the afternoon.

Childers said he thought he was going to die because he was so cold and no one was responding to his calls for help.

Childers said last Monday that when water started coming in he rushed to the front of the boat to grab his life jacket while slipping off a heavy coat he was wearing.

"I managed to hook one arm through the life jacket when a wave knocked me out of the boat," Childers said.

Now in the water, he looked for a way out and saw some rocks about an eighth of a mile away.

"I slid the life jacket under my chest and started paddling to the rocks," Childers explained.

When he reached the rock outcropping, Childers lay on his back resting while he tried to figure out how he was going to get help.

"I waved at other boats, but they were on the other side of the lake and didn't see me," Childers noted.

He remained on the rocks until it started to get dark, yelling for help.

"I slid the life jacket under my chest and started paddling to the rocks."

Despite rebuke, Christmas event still on the books

An event that drew a rebuke by the Electric City Council against one of its members is still on the books.

Councilmember Birdie Hensley was officially warned last month for presuming to speak for the city when she and fellow Councilmember Lonna Bussert proposed a Christmas event at North Dam Park.

The reprimand stuck on Hensley, who took the blame for proposing an event without clearing it with the full council. On Sept. 13, the council issued Hensley the rebuke, overlooking Bussert's part in the planning for the Christmas event.

Hensley got her reprimand letter at last Tuesday night's council meeting, but she wasn't on hand to receive it; she was on vacation, and the council started the meeting by excusing her from being there.

But the Christmas event is still on, now officially proposed by Bussert, who also was not at the meeting in person but attended a portion of it by phone.

Her proposal calls for a fundraiser for city parks on Nov. 26 at North Dam Park, sponsored by a variety of clubs and organizations. She wasn't specific as to who the sponsoring parties might be. Funds would come from a drawing for a bicycle. Tickets for the drawing would be sold by the

organizations, who would take part in a Christmas lighting at the park, all part of the proposed event.

Plans put before the council were still sketchy, but the council voted \$50 of city funds to help the event along.

The letter of reprimand made by the overall council was for Hensley's violation of rule 14, which states: "Council members shall not act ultra vires, or outside the scope of their authority and duties as council members."

Electric City will not be the official sponsor of the event, but any proceeds will benefit the city's parks.

Candidates speak at forum

A forum for Okanogan County commissioner candidates was markedly civil Thursday night in Coulee Dam, despite a campaign season possibly among the most contentious in recent county history.

That may have been due to a decidedly local focus in the questions put to the four by moderator Bob Valen, the vice president of the Grand Coulee Dam Area Chamber of Commerce, which sponsored the event.

Valen sprinkled in questions submitted from an audience of 18 among a dozen pre-written for the event.

Commissioner Sheila Kennedy, who represents District 1, including this end of the county, pointed several times to the need for inter-governmental collaboration, not duplication, to get services here. She praised several currently provided by the Colville Tribes and noted two bridges the county and tribes are working together to repair.

Her challenger, Chris Branch, a city planner who was born in Nespelem, said he has been in every city hall in the county in his work and believes the Okanogan County Council of Governments should be expanded beyond its current transportation focus to solve problems in all regions.

Running for the District 2 seat, Ashley Thrasher, a wildland fire fighter and construction worker, promised to visit each district

Electric City rejects land offer

Mosquito district will build a shop

The Electric City Council rejected an offer from Grant County Mosquito District 2 to sell the city a 10-foot by 90-foot strip of land on property it owns on Coulee Boulevard, where it plans to build a pole building for its headquarters.

The mosquito district, in a letter to the city, said that a survey of its property showed that Kent Street encroaches 15 feet onto its property and also that the city's fire hydrant is also on its property.

The district was asking \$1.81 a square foot for the property, and for the city to waive its hookup fees for water and sewer connections.

Electric City's public works

director, Ken Dexter, advised the council to turn the offer down.

The strip of land in question is property the mosquito district recently purchased and where it plans to build a 40-foot by 80-foot steel, pole headquarters building that will house the district's shop, office and meeting space.

The offer to sell the 15-foot strip of land to the city would cost Electric City \$1,629. In addition, the waiving of water and sewer hookup fees would total \$1,750 for water and \$1,025 for sewers, bringing the city's total cost to \$4,404.

The council voted unanimously to reject the mosquito district's offer.

The district's letter stated that it hoped to go out to bid on its building sometime this month.

Rescued

That's when Dale Taylor, an Electric City resident, called police and stated that he had heard a faint call for help, but from Lakeview Avenue he couldn't tell where it was coming from.

Police Sgt. Gary Moore, stated in his report that he could hear the call for help but couldn't locate where it was coming from because wind was carrying the sound in several directions. In the search that followed, several others also reported that they could hear someone calling for help.

It first was thought that the call for help was coming from the Pleasant Valley area.

Officer Dan Holland, who also was at the scene, determined the direction of the calls.

Childers had decided that, since it was getting dark, he needed to do something, so he slipped into the water and headed to shore.

He swam what he guessed was another one-eighth of a mile to a rocky and uneven shoreline, shivering all the way.

"I saw someone blinking his headlights and then a blue blinking light and thought then that help was on the way," Childers said.

Moore made his way to where Childers was and then the two of them walked to where the ambu-

lance crew was waiting.

By then, Childers said, it was almost midnight and he was really cold. After being checked out by the ambulance crew, he drove himself back to Brewster.

Childers' son returned the next day and was able to retrieve the boat, a cooler, and his father's hat that had floated to shore.

"I guess I will have to get a bigger boat and then return to fish," Childers said.

"I want to thank Sgt. Moore and all the others that were responsible in rescuing me," Childers said. "I thought I was a goner."

Please vote YES so Douglas County Fire Protection District# 3 may continue to provide fire and emt services within our district in the future.

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

A federal review of the entire river will be worth watching

The three federal agencies whose dams control the Columbia River system are rethinking the whole complex process, and that should make everyone pay close attention.

Next Tuesday, the Bureau of Reclamation, Army Corps of Engineers and the Bonneville Power Administration will hold in Coulee Dam the second in a series of 15 public meetings with Wenatchee to Missoula to Astoria inviting the public to comment on the scope of work to include as it launches another massive effort to rethink the system in favor of ensuring endangered fish survival.

The rules of the effort the Pacific Northwest region had agreed on were eviscerated last May by a federal judge in Oregon, and now the agencies must consider the possibility that breaching a dam might make more sense, from a salmon's perspective, than all the other efforts the agencies had agreed to pursue.

They have until January of 2018 to write a new Environmental Impact Statement for the whole river system, including the Snake River that hosts the dams most likely to be considered for a breach.

The "scoping meeting" at Coulee Dam Town Hall takes place from 4 to 7 p.m., Tuesday, Oct. 24. If you miss that meeting and the 13 others that come after it, you can still catch the "webinar" (an online seminar) on Tuesday, Dec. 13.

While we are glad the government makes the requisite attempts to engage the populace in such matters, and that it is using modern technology to help in that effort, we must ask: Why is it always on a bloody Tuesday night (our deadline)?



William J. (Bill) Schieber

Bill Schieber, 93, passed away peacefully on Thursday, Oct. 13, 2016, at the place he was most comfortable – his home in Ephrata, Washington, with his family by his side.

Bill was born in New Plymouth, Idaho, on July 24, 1923, to Charles and Maude Schieber. The family moved to Hoquiam, Washington, then later to Bremerton, Washington, where his father established a contracting company. Bill spent most of his youth in Bremerton, graduating from Bremerton High School in 1941.



Bill was drafted into the U.S. Navy in 1944 and was stationed in San Francisco, California, at a naval facility that repaired landing craft damaged in the war. He served until 1946, then returned to Bremerton where he completed a carpenter apprentice program and joined his dad in the contracting business.

In 1947 Bill met Doris Kisler. After three years of skiing, skating, and dancing they were married in 1950. Bill and Doris would have celebrated their 66th wedding anniversary on October 20, 2016.

A job opportunity in the early 1960s with the National Park Service brought Bill and his family to Mt. Rainier National Park, which proved to be the start of a long career with the government. Bill and his family enjoyed many years in the beautiful setting of Mt. Rainier and Eatonville, Wash. In 1971, when the Facility Manager position became available at the Coulee Dam National Recreation Area, Bill saw it as an opportunity to advance his career

and to be near his family's favorite vacation spot.

Bill retired in 1986 from the National Park Service and lived in Electric City until 2011 when he and Doris moved to Ephrata.

In his earlier years, Bill was an ice skater, square dancer, snow skier, and water skier. After retirement, he and Doris enjoyed traveling both in the U.S. and abroad, and continued favorite pastimes like snow skiing, bowling, boating and fishing on Lake Roosevelt, and watching Mariners baseball. He was a talented woodworker and

created many treasures for family and friends.

Bill was preceded in passing by his parents and his sister, Maxine Bjorling.

He is survived by his wife, Doris; his children and grandchildren: Jack and his wife Agnes (Shoreline, Washington) and Jack's daughters: Suzi and Molly; Joanne Nelson and her husband Chris (Sammamish, Washington) and their children: Lindsay, Craig, and Eric; Carol Mayer and her husband, Dave (Ephrata) and their children: Jenna and Jared; and his son, Mike Tostenrude and his wife, Marlane (Vancouver, Washington) and their sons: Jeff, Joe, and Nick. each month to keep in touch with people's needs across the county. She said the county doing a better job of communicating its intentions and involving citizens would help avoid future lawsuits, several of which the county is involved in now.

Kennedy, the sole incumbent left facing an organized opposition group formed to elect all new commissioners, said the lawsuits were filed by people who had been "at the table" in discussions on the issues the sued over.

Branch said the lawsuits stem from an ideologically split county and that more communication is the only way to avoid them.

Andy Hover, manager of North Valley Lumber in Winthrop, is also seeking the District 2 seat. He said focusing county resources on specific areas to solve problems is the only way to tackle some that are nationwide, not just in the county. Services to address widespread drug addiction and mental health needs are best focused on helping kids at schools and keeping drugs out, he said.
