Newsbriefs

Moratorium on medical marijuana extended

Electric City's council extended its moratorium on the establishment of medical marijuana collective gardens for another six months at its meeting last week. The current moratorium would have run out April 30.

Health District active

Grant County Health District reported on its activities in the area last year. The Health District maintained a life jacket loaner station at Steamboat Rock State Park, participated with Coulee Medical Center in the Region 7 Healthcare Coalition and distributed bike helmets in a safety program at Electric City's Earth Day celebration.

The Health District report stated that the whooping cough epidemic has been downgraded. Last year there were 56 cases in the county and 580 people who came in contact with those infected.

Sheriff in town

Grant County Sheriff Tom Jones will be at Pepperjack's Restaurant, Monday, May 7, at 7 p.m., to visit with people about their public safety concerns. The public is invited.

Health District at Earth Day

As part of its "safe kids" program the Grant County Health District was on hand last Saturday for Electric City's Earth Day observance. Officials were on hand fitting helmets and educating children to always wear a helmet when riding their bicycles.

Spencer recognized

Lake Roosevelt senior Shundina Spencer was recognized at Monday's school board meeting for completing 3,444 hours of community service during her high school career. This year's seniors, 62 of them, completed 7,745 hours of community service or at minimum wage, would have earned over \$70,000.

School district has clean audit

Dwight Remmick from the Educational Service District told school board members that the district had a clean audit by state auditors and it was through hard and careful work by staff members. Remmick along with school officials attended the audit exit meeting.

Towns to meet on sewer plant project

A portion of the Coulee Dam and Elmer City councils will meet Friday, May 4, at 10 a.m. at Coulee Dam City Hall to discuss the new wastewater treatment plant project.

Mayor Quincy Snow asked that two council members from his public works committee free themselves up for the meeting.

The meeting was requested by Coulee Dam to update Elmer City on the progress of the wastewater treatment plant project.

Elmer City said the meeting was just between mayors Quincy Snow and Mary Jo Carey, two council members from each town and Jeff Stevens, from the engineering firm of Gray & Osborne, and was not a meeting open to the public.

Mayor Snow also stated that it wasn't a public meeting since it was the two town's public works committees meeting and not the whole councils.

Coulee Dam's two public works committee members are councilmembers Bob Poch and Andy Trader. Councilmembers Larry Holford and Donna DeWinkler will represent Elmer City.

Leaders in Electric City are putting together items they want to talk about out of town.

At a 38-minute meeting of the Electric City Council last Tuesday night, members said they wanted to discuss short-term and longterm goals for the city.

A mission statement was suggested as a way to get council members moving together in the same direction.

The retreat will be held in the Grant County Public Works building near the Ephrata airport and will last from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. this Friday.

The meeting is open to the public and information and a map of the location will be available at Electric City's city hall.

The 9 a.m. meeting will be spearheaded by Canfield & Associates, the city's insurance broker.

At 10 a.m., City Attorney Katherine Kennison will discuss the role of council members in city government, and then emcee the remainder of the meeting.

"It's an open meeting and anyone can attend," Mayor Jerry Sands reminded the council.

Port discovering cost of golf course

Commissioners of Port District 7 got a taste of how expensive it is to run a golf course as they poured over a massive number of golf course related bills last Thursday

It prompted chairman Orville Scharbach to ask: "How long can we remain solvent?"

Secretary/Treasurer Kary Byam responded, "Not long at this rate.

Port district commissioners went on and made plans to spend \$10,000 to purchase a new mower to mow the rough along fairways at Banks Lake Golf Course. When

one person asked how they could get by without getting a new rough mower, greenskeeper George Davis replied, "With 20 men and push mowers.

The commissioners, now caretakers of the golf course, voted to purchase the mower.

Commissioner Stan Conklin stated that he didn't think any additional help would be required and said he and Commissioner Larry Maier would each run the mower a day, covering the two days a week needed to mow the rough.

Conklin and Maier also each spend a day managing the pro

Davis told commissioners that

crews would start plugging and sanding the greens Friday.

Commissioners then voted to cut golf rates in half since the greens would be rough for some time after being plugged and sanded.

18-hole play will cost \$15 and 9-hole play will be \$10 during this time.

Mike Parisian, who works the pro shop, told commissioners that the golf course now has 61 members, nearly double last year's membership.

Byam told commissioners that the golf course application for a liquor license was now before the State Liquor Board.

"We're on a fast-track project," Superintendent Dennis Carlson told a handful of people who turned out last Thursday to get an update on the Grand Coulee Dam School District's plans for a new K-12 school complex.

The group heard architect Laurence Rose provide a best guess timeline for the \$46 million project.

Look for bids to go out in January, 2013, with construction starting soon afterward, Rose told the audience, "and students occupying the new building in late August, 2014."

However, both

Rose and Carlson explained that in order for the project to get the "fast track" they need to convince the state Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction that everything is shovel ready and that planning work has already been done.

Carlson explained that if OSPI credits the district with work already done, then the district can meet its goal of going to bid early next year and occupying the new buildings in August, 2014. Otherwise, occupancy could be as late as April, 2015.

Architects Rose, Jim Coles, president of Design West, and Cameron Golightly, will all be involved in the project and they answered questions from those attending.

Questions about floor surfaces, kitchen deliveries, offices, art, and other topics were talked about.

Several town meetings will be scheduled as architects proceed with ideas picked up from school staff, a civic committee that met separately Thursday afternoon, and local citizens who turn out

for evening information sessions.

Surveyors were at the site Wednesday afternoon shooting grades and developing information on what was underneath the old Wright El-

ementary building. Demolition of this surplused building will occur this summer while school children are on vacation.

Architects answered questions on commons spaces for students to gather and the need to keep eating areas for younger students separate from upper grades.

Classroom size of about 900 square feet was suggested and work progression will depend on how far the \$31.5 million now available will go. A new gym will be built in phase two, after the classroom-academic portion of the building is complete, and as money becomes available.

Police release statement on fatal accident

Colville Tribal Police released information today about the fatal car accident that claimed the life of 15-year-old Rickey Louie-Burris April 18 on Gold Lake Road.

Police were dispatched to the accident scene eight miles north of Nespelem just before 5 p.m.

From the press release:

"Upon arrival CTP Officers located 4 people on the scene of the accident. 3 were identified as juveniles, and one adult. This group consisted of one juvenile male, two juvenile females, and one adult. One of the juvenile females was pronounced deceased on scene.

The juvenile male was identified as the driver of the vehicle. He was booked into the Okanogan County Juvenile Facility pending charges of vehicular homicide, as the initial investigation showed speed as the contributing factor. The occupants of the vehicle were not wearing their seatbelts."





A while ago, I wrote a column about how heartwarming it is to see children using their imagination in a world where most of their toys involve some sort of technology. > When the Kindle was announced, Amazon CEO Jeff Bezos declared, "It's important to embrace new technologies instead of to fight them." His statement made me feel a bit sheepish, as that is sometimes just how I feel. And while I

initially resisted getting an e-reader, saying that I preferred the feel of a real book in my hands, once I actually got a Kindle I was delighted with the technology that gave me an endless library of books at my fingertips.

I never used to consider myself old-fashioned, and even now I bristle at being characterized as someone who doesn't like technology. I applaud what technology has done for science and medicine and even entertainment. I love the ability to have my family and friends an easy phone call away. My hesitation, like many others, is rooted in a sort of fear of the unknown. Smartphones can be incredibly wonderful. In a I fear that the advancements will irrevocably alter the

I know that eventually, each new technology that comes around will at some point probably become indispensable to me like the cell phone did, and I will undoubtedly love it and wonder how I ever got on without it. Perhaps my glacial pace for accepting these seemingly radical changes to my way of life will somehow prepare me better for when I finally do jump on the technological bandwagon.

A Tale of Two Cities

No, not a story of two late 16th century cities facing good and bad times, but rather a more contemporary story of another Dickens metaphor... one of belief and one of incredulity. The cities – Elmer City and Coulee Dam. The time – the last quarter of the 20th century.

I'm not typically prone to conspiracy theories nor elaborate exaggerations. And with that said, I'm going to unwind a story for you based upon real records, real events, and very real agreements. A story defined by a 1975 partnership contract between the town of Coulee Dam and the town of Elmer City. A story steeped in conspiracy and one that reads like every nuance must be exaggerated for theatrical effect. A good novel, if you will. But, and alas, the exaggerations are actually very real, and as for a conspiracy – the odds are growing!

Not long ago, the town of Coulee Dam decided, with little advanced notice to its "partner," Elmer City, or the broader impacted community (including the Bureau of Reclamation and the Colville Tribe), that it would begin the process of defining a future that would impact the region in a financially engineer with preparing a Wastewater Facilities Plan that the very same engineer recommended they prepare. Confused yet? Oh, it gets better! The town then decided to pay this same engineer \$1,251,500 for services related to the facility they had recommended in the plan they prepared for the town based upon the engineer's recommendation. Whew, now I'm confused! And to add further to the confusion (and concerns) – there was no peer review, no independent analysis of need, no sustentative analysis of alternatives. This whole process told the council). Sort of like an Ira

gives a new definition to "conflict Levin Stepford wife! They can't of interest." To be fair, the town of Coulee Dam did host a joint council meeting between the two towns to define the problem and the needs, and to "tell" Elmer City what the solution was ... a meeting that was more of an "update" than a partnership/consensus-building process

But let's put all this into some historical perspective ... back to the "Tale of Two Cities." I used that pesky Public Records Act again (the one mayor Snow would like to see abolished) to review hundreds of pages of documents including the 1975 agreement between the two towns. Missing from the requested document stack of public records was the actual executed Agreement and a Supplemental Agreement entered into a year later. I asked the town clerk for them and was told; "Greg, that's all there is." So I made the same request of Elmer City... they provided me with the documents. You just gotta wonder. By now you only chump change... Coulee Dam might be thinking; "Why, oh why, has, in this year's budget, over \$4 would anyone want to know these things anyway?!" I do. I want to know who is, and why we, are going to pay between \$5 million and crippling way. They tasked their \$7 million for a new sewer treatment plant we really don't need, can't afford to buy, and aren't required to build ... and now I know the "who is" part. If you guessed Coulee Dam, like I initially did, you only get a 75-percent grade for that answer.

Thirty-seven years ago, the two towns (Elmer City and Coulee Dam) entered into a lopsided 50year (yup, that's 50) agreement wherein Coulee Dam can do as they wish and Elmer City apparently has no choice but to concur (at least that's what the town clerk

even get out of the "partnership" since Article 5 reads; "this Agreement may only be terminated by mutual consent." They became married, so to speak. Yet Coulee Dam has chosen to ignore the traditional partnership paradigm wherein "decisions" are made by cooperative involvement and consensus and compromise. Decisions made in an environment where the words like "consensus" and "compromise" are operative BEFORE the decisions, before the commitment(s).

Coulee Dam, just last month, provided Elmer City (their partner) with a copy of the \$70,000 "Plan" that was completed well over a year ago! I had to get my copy from the state. Then, with equal arrogance, Coulee Dam spent another \$103,000 of Elmer City money to pay for their "share" of the design engineering for a facility that really isn't necessary at all. And these costs are really million to start building the new plant and, you guessed it, Elmer City will have to come up with about \$1.6 million for their share (in total, that's about \$13,000 from each home owner) ... shhhh, they don't know that yet... tell them in the morning when they wake up!

I'm embarrassed and ashamed that my town, Coulee Dam, has allowed itself to be managed by a consultant from Yakima and a town clerk from Coulee City while our arrogant mayor and some of our city council have taken advantage of having the world's largest sand pile in town ... the perfect place to validate the ostrich with its head in the sand metaphor!



Board agrees on school calendar



The proposed project has two alternatives:

Alternative 1

The proposed project would use Reclamation's existing Banks Lake as the upper reservoir and Roosevelt Lake as the lower reservoir. The proposed project would consist of the following new facilities: (1) an upper reservoir inlet/outlet structure equipped with trash racks; (2) a 1.5-mile-long penstock consisting of a vertical shaft, power tunnel segments, and a tailrace section, extending between the upper reservoir inlet/outlet and the reversible turbine/generator units in the powerhouse; (3) an underground powerhouse containing four reversible turbine/generator units rated for 250 megawatts (MW) each, for a total installed generation of 1,000 MW, or a powerhouse located on the shore of Roosevelt Lake, also containing four 250-MW reversible turbine/generator units; (4) a 2-mile-long, 500-kilovolt (kV) transmission line extending from the project powerhouse to an existing 500-kV substation; and (5) appurtenant facilities. The estimated annual generation of Alternative 1 for the Banks Lake Project would be 2,263 gigawatt-hours (GWh).

Alternative 2

The proposed project would use Reclamation's existing Banks Lake as the lower reservoir.
